PEKING

We hear President Ford had a warmer welcome today in Peking than was accorded Richard Nixon in Seventy-two; but, later - at a state banquet much criticism for pursuing detente with Russia. Chinese Vice-Premier Teng Hsiao-Ping, in an official toast - saying all the rhetoric about 'detente' - cannot cover up the stark reality of the growing danger of a new world war." Adding ominously "the outcome of a war is decided by the people - not by one or two new types of weapons."

Informed in advance though - the President was apparently unperturbed; in his answering toast, saying:

"Yes, the world confronts all with danger - but it also offers opportunities." Adding: "The U.S. will strive both to reduce the dangers and to explore new opportunities without illusions." Secretary of State Kissinger also telling newsmen: "What they said about detente was expected - they've been saying it to everybody." And now...

In the Middle East & Jerusalem - an

emergency meeting of the Israeli cabinet hollowed by six hours of heated debate. The Israeli government later saying it plans to boycott UN debate next month on the Middle East - because the Palestine Liberation organization has been invited to take part. Israel adding that, indeed, the UN invitation to the PLO - "is likely in general to harm peace efforts in the Middle East."

Senior Hospital doctors throughout Britain joined young interns today in refusing to treat any but critically ill patients. The younger doctors up in arms over understaffing that forces them to work eighty-hours a week - at wages less than those paid for manual labor. The older doctors protesting a government plan - to phase out paying patients, except in private clinics. A spokesman for a doctor's association saying: "They are not looking for any sign of weakness = from the government just a sign of reason."

From a special committee of the World Council of Chuches in session today at Nairobi a report urging a step-up in the council's aid to guerrilla groups around the world. This called by some a "guns for guerrillas" program -- but the church committee saying it's the only way to "combat racism". Especially in Southern Africa.
