season for many. "Peace on earth - goodwill to man." And
this year - maybe this year - it could come true.

At any rate, the latest from Washington - saying that a Vietnam peace settlement is possible by Christmas.

Henry Kissinger for the U.S. and Nguyen Phu Duc for South Vietnam - now in the process of working out the final kinks - we are told; with Dr. Kissinger hoping to wrap it all up - when he returns to Paris this weekend.

More than that, Dr. Kissinger is also said to have formulated - a new Middle East plan. One that would start - with a reopening of the Suez Canal; leading, hopefully, to peaceful coexistence - between the Arabs and Israelis.

"Peace on earth - goodwill to man?" No, not yet. Hardly! But there's still hope.

For the second day in row, India today was making a public attempt - to rebuild its bridges with the U.S. India's President V.V. Giri - addressing a meeting of Indian state governors. Expressing hope that the U.S. and India "can develop a sounder relationship - based on understanding and respect for mutual interest."

Touching all bases, Giri also said: "I hope that China, too, will see the spirit of the times - and make a positive response towards normalizing relations between our two countries."

WASHINGTON FOLLOW NEW DELHI

Here at home - Secretary of State Rogers quickly responded, saying the U.S. welcomes as he put it - "the positive note struck" by Indian officials; and further "reciprocates their expressed intentions." Rogers adding: "It is important that India and the U.S. - both work together toward this end."

From Key Biscayne - an announcement today that

George Schulz is staying on as Treasury Secretary. He thus

becomes the President's second - second-term Cabinet

holdover; joining in that exclusive company - as you know,

Secretary of State William Rogers.

The Florida White House made it plain, however that Schulz will be much more than just a Treasury
Secretary; saying that he will also head - a new Cabinet-level
Council on Economic Policy. A spokesman saying: "In this
capacity, Secretary Schulz will be the focal point - for the
overall coordination of the policy-making process in economic
matters, both domestic and international."

A special tribute today to Neil McElroy - from

President Nixon. The President saying: "The U.S. has lost
an outstanding citizen, the American people have lost a

dedicated public servant - and I have lost a valued friend
and associate."

The President also saying of Neil McElroy of

Cincinnati: "To all of his undertakings - he brought the

gifts of high character and keen intelligence."

Neil McElroy - the son of an Ohio school teacher, worked he s way thru Harvard - and then returned home to join the Proctor & Gamble Company, of which he ultimately became President.

And for some years Procter & Gamble was my sponsor. There were those who called our agreement - "a gold-plated contract." Indirectly he played a part in making it possible for Lowell Jr. and me to cross the Himalayas to Tibet.

Later he joined the Eisenhower Administration - as

Secretary of Defense and at the Pentagon, presided over the big switch - from manpower to missiles. When that was done he rejoined Procter & Gamble as Chairman of the Board.

Through all the years that I knew him, in government and out - a forceful, dedicated man; but more than that - a warm and wonderful human being. Neil McElroy - only sixty-eight; one of the true giants of our time.

There's nothing new under the sun - so the saying goes; but underground - something else again.

For example, a discovery reported today - that two of the world's biggest cave systems are really one and the same. a big power plant - soon to follow. Its generating capacity
- expected to hit eventually more than seven Million
horsepower; or enough to light up Quebec and Montreal enough, in fact, to light up the whole city of New York.

All of which reminds me, Bill - did you ever hear the story about the three holes in the ground? Well - well - well.

In Mexico City today and throughout Mexico - it was "here come the brides;" more than ninety thousand, in all - coming in all ages, shapes, sizes and colors; taking in lawful, legal wedlock - the men with whom they've been living for years, many of them.
