Good evening everybody: The big question today

at Senate Watergate hearings - was simply "who's lying?";

a question that was finally put into words - by Senator

Baker of Tennessee.

The Senator noting glaring "discrepancies" in the testimony of James McCord and his present attorney, Bernard Fensterwald - as compared with that of McCord's previous attorney, Gerald Alch. He then asked Alch: "Is there anything you can suggest to us - that might shed some light on that apparent conflict of testimony?"

Alch replying: "Yes, sir, I suggest that both Mr.

McCord and I, if he's willing - submit to a polygraph test."

Alch further suggesting that he and Fensterwald - should

also take lie detector tests.

Fensterwald's answer to that - later delivered to reporters during the luncheon recess. He said at first he

would take a lie-detector test - "only if all witnesses"

were given such a test. When pressed, adding that he would

not take such a test - if only he and Alch were involved.

McCord's position - initially the same as that of

Fensterwald. He then said, however: "I'll do whatever the

committee asks for."

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### BARKER FOLLOW WATERGATE

Next witness: Another of the convicted Watergate

burglars - Cuban-born Bernard Barker; under a grant of

immunity - telling all about it for the first time in public.

Barker saying he was recruited for this and other

political espionage - by fellow conspirator E. Howard Hunt.

He called his actions - "a matter of national security."

Barker adding that the Watergate raiders were seeking

evidence of alleged campaign contributions - from Castro

Cuba; contributions supposedly made to Senator McGovern 
and "possibly" Senator Kennedy.

Barker also said that he had no "personal grudge" against McGovern - but strong!y "disagreed" with his philosophy.

Late today, U.S. Attorney Harold Titus announced that the Federal prosecutors investigating the Watergate Affair will remain on the job - and indictments are expected within sixty to ninety days. Titus says one key figure - whom he doesn't identify - has already agreed to plead guilty without being granted immunity, and to testify as a prosecution witness.

Republican William Mills of Maryland - was found shot to death today at his farm home in Easton, Maryland.

This coming in the midst of charges that Mills had received secret financial aid - from the Committee to Re-Elect the President. Although Mills had said he did nothing improper, Police say that the shotgun wound that killed him - was apparently self-inflicted.

Thank you, Lowell. A final story - in a moment.

I have been chatting with the dynamic head of

Pepperdine University. Chancellor Young and their trustee

Perry Botkin, tell me Pepperdine's Malibu campus has become

the birthplace of a rare, perhaps unique trust.

The late John Tyler - who founded the Farmers

Insurance Group and his wife, setting up a five million dollar ecology fund, to provide for an annual award of one-hundred-and-fifty thousand - to the person contributing most to improving the world's environment.

This - in the words of the donors, "to help keep the U.S. in the fore-front of the fight against pollution;" to help overcome any "forces - despoiling land, air and water."

Britain's latest sex-and-security scandal has claimed a second victim. Earl Jellicoe tendering his resignation - as leader of the House of Lords and Lord Privy Seal; saying he was doing so - because of "some casual affairs" involving "a ring of call girls."

Jellicoe's lawyer insisted, however, there had been no "breach of the law." Adding that "no danger to national security - arises out of these matters." In the same vein, Britain's Prime Minister Heath accepting the resignation - "with deep regret," and ordering an investigation.

After an overnight stay at Camp David - President

Nixon today returned to the White House; to confer with

Henry Kissinger - newly-returned from Paris; and later,

to host a White House gala - for former U.S. prisoners of

war in Vietnam.

The President telling the ex-POW's - he was determined to protect the nation's "highly-classified documents." "Had we not had that kind of secrecy" - he continued - "you would still be in Hanoi." The President also saying: "It is time to stop making heroes - out of those people who steal secrets and publish them in the newspapers." Whereupon - a standing ovation.

One of the celebrities who will also attend the White

House affair - film star John Wayne; who earlier - at

Nashville, en route to Washington - was getting a few gripes

off his chest.

Wayne saying: "I don't like the label of superpatriot." Adding: "I think I feel just like about a hundred
and sixty million other people do - out of the two hundred
million people in the U.S. I'm talking about the middle
class. If it weren't for them - this country would
collapse."

John Wayne also said he hates politics and politicians
- and "being labeled a right-winger." "I have openly
supported six people running for office" - said he - "and
three of them were Democrats."

The world's first joint U.S. and Soviet space exhibit

- was unveiled today in Paris; a display featuring

reproductions of the U.S. and Russian spaceships - to be

used in our first joint venture in space in Nineteen-Seventy
Five.

Four Russian cosmonauts and one American astronaut
General Tom Stafford - were also there. Stafford saying:
"This joint project should be a way to open continued
cooperation between our two countries - and to demonstrate
to the world that we can live and work together in space."

twenty-nine points - closing at nine twenty-four point

forty-four - the biggest one-day gain since Nineteen-Seventy
One. One factor may have been the government announcement

that U.S. exports exceeded imports in April for the first

time in Nineteen months.
