Yucca Flats, Nevada - another underground
nuclear blast today; with an explosive device about the size
of a dinner plate - buried about a third of a mile down rocking the desert floor for hundreds of miles around. This
- we are told - the first nuclear explosion - specifically
designed to release underground deposits of natural gas; with
project director John Kelly predicting that five years from
now - we may be heating our homes and cooking our meals
from gasses so obtained.

From near and far - they came by the thousands today; the fans of Louis Satchmo Armstrong - paying their last respects to the famed trumpeter - as he lay in state - in a New York armory.

At the same time - in Moscow - the newspaper

Soviet Culture, paying Louis Armstrong a rare tribute

observed: That "perhaps 'is most beautiful feature" - was

his humility. Soviet Culture noted: "He repeatedly said he

was just a trumpet player who had only one aim and dream
to give joy to people; and as such," said the Moscow

magazine, "he will remain in the memories of his fans."

At Jeddah - the commercial Red Sea capital of
Saudi Arabia, seaport to Mecca - it was extremely hot and
humid today a hundred and over in the shade. Nevertheless,
there was a royal reception with all the traditional pomp
and ceremony in honor of U S Vice President Agnew. Crown
Prince Kahlid Al-Saud was in Jeddah for this formal welcome.

The Vice President in stressing U S friendship with Saudi Arabia, said the U S government "is committed to seeking a just and lasting peace" in the Near East, which he spoke of as of "such importance to the world." After which in an air conditioned limousine he drove to Jeddah's Hamra Palace.

BEIRUT FOLLOW JEDDAH

Elsewhere in the Near East - at Beirut - the

Al-Fatah Palestinian guerrilla group - was claiming credit

today for the rocket attack on a Tel Aviv suburb. A spokesman

saying the attack force - was one of Al Fatah's special units

operating inside Israel.

While in Cairo there was a meeting of the Palestian National Council. This is referred to as a parliament in exile; with its goal - we are told - to coordinate the efforts of all guerrilla organizations.

At Paris a North Vietnam attempt to give the appearance of something encouraging. Madame Binh offering to meet separately and privately with US officials; supposedly to facilitate a settlement.

Hanoi's LeDuc Tho also is spreading the word - that North Vietnam's latest peace proposal was not a "take it or leave it" package. Suggesting that troop withdrawal and prisoners issues - can be resolved quite apart from a political settlement. But today's session of official peace talks another story. David Bruce for the US - posing a series of questions about the latest Communist offer; noting that it contains "new elements" - but still leaves much to be desired; adding that the Communist proposals were "so sweeping and categorical in nature - that we cannot possibly accept them without discussion or negotiation; "therefore, urging a fresh start - by means of private talks; "free from the glare of publicity - and without the need to

make public statements except as mutually agreed upon."

Bruce later admitted that all he got from the

Communist side was "a decided no; which led him to believe

- said he - that the Communists "wish to continue to use

these sessions - as a forum for propaganda."

Rising hopes in Helsinki. With fifth round Salt talks beginning there today - in an atmosphere said to have been just "great". Gerard Smith for the US and Vladimir Semenov for the Soviet Union - conferring for nearly two hours; according to conference sources, with their presentations today said to reflect "the same optimistic note expressed in their arrival statements."

All of which indicates that "substantial talks" will begin immediately; and the prospect of what is referred to as a "limited treaty."

Spokesman Lee Edwards calling this - an attempt to off-set the effects of "ping-pong diplomacy" by pointing out the many reasons we should continue to support Nationalist China - as opposed to Peking.

For the first time in the history of the US

Senate - a woman cleric was allowed to give the opening

prayer today. The Reverend Doctor Wilmina Roland of

Philadelphia - an official of the United Presbyterian

Church - saying in her prayer: "As our nation plays

its part in the life of the world - help us know that

all wisdom does not reside in us; and that other nations

have the right to differ with us - as to what is best

for them."

Later on, reporters asking the Senate

Majority Leader - what he thought of Doctor Roland's

prayer. Mike Mansfield replying: "All I can say
is 'amen'..." As usual we say selent tomorran'
