An all-American on the football fleld -- an all-American on the battie field. That's the story today from Viet Nam -about Captain Bill Carpenter, Army's famed "1onesome end" -- of a few seasons back.

Captain Carpenter leading the pursuit of a large force of fleeing Viet Cong -- in a follow-up to that big battle about three hundred miles north of Saigon when suddenly the enemy decided to turn and flght.

The Communists over-running Carpenter's Company -threatening to wipe it out; when Bill called for a direct air strike -- in a bid to break up thecounter offenses. "Put the Napalm on us" -- sald Carplenter. "At least we'11 get some of them -- too."

Amazingly -- it worked. U.S. jets striking with deadiy accuracy -- to blunt the enemy attack. Permitting Carpenter

to re-group his remaining men -- with another battered company.
B111 Carpenter -- winner already of a silver star, a
bronz star and a purple heart -- in his brief Army career. And now he's up -- for a congressional medal of honor.

Here at home -- another chink today in bi-partisan
support -- of U.S. policy in Vietnam. The latest .- from

Seante Majority Leader Everett Dirksen -- heretofore one of
the President's chief supporters.
Dirksen accusing the Administration of consistent failure
-- as he put it -- "to take the Congress and theAmerican people into its proper confidence regarding Vietnam."
"Such a failure is inexcusable" -- said Dirksen. Adding .- "it could be tragic."

Prompt rebuttal -- from White House Secretary Bill Movers, who said that the President is doing everything possible -"to keep the people informed." "There is no information in this government .- that is not available to members of Congress in both parties" -- said Moyers.

## PRESIDENT FOLLOW DIRKSEN

As for the President himself - he was chief speaker today
at a senior seminar of the State Department Foreign Service

School. There telling a group of career diplomats .- that the world "stands balanced between high danger and rare opportunity." What with mounting problems in Southeast Asia,

Africa -- and elsewhere across the globe.

There is no overnight solution to any of these
problems -- said the President. Adding, however, that
"when change is so painfully slow in coming .- we must constantly work to accelerate its pace." Ever searching -- said he -. "for the light at the end of the tunnel."

Something that triggered an unexplainable fire .- in the passenger cabin. But exhaustive study of the wreckage -- is said to have eliminated all normal sources of aircraft fire -- including sabotage.

What then -- could have caused it? Although they can't prove it -- investigators suggesting the fire could have started -- by accidental ignition of a woman's hair spray.
