GOOD EVENING EVERYBODY:

The Communists over-running Carpenter's Company -threatening to wipe it out; when Bill called for a direct
air strike -- in a bid to break up the counter offenses.

"Put the Napalm on us" -- said Carpenter. "At least we'll
get some of them -- too."

Amazingly -- it worked. U.S. jets striking with deadly accuracy -- to blunt the enemy attack. Permitting Carpenter

to re-group his remaining men -- with another battered company.

And now he's up -- for a congressional medal of honor.

Here at home -- another chink today in bi-partisan support -- of U.S. policy in Vietnam. The latest -- from Seante Majority Leader Everett Dirksen -- heretofore one of the President's chief supporters.

Dirksen accusing the Administration of consistent failure
-- as he put it -- "to take the Congress and the American people
into its proper confidence regarding Vietnam."

"Such a failure is inexcusable" -- said Dirksen. Adding
-- "it could be tragic."

Prompt rebuttal -- from White House Secretary Bill Moyers, who said that the President is doing everything possible -- "to keep the people informed." "There is no information in this government -- that is not available to members of Congress in both parties" -- said Moyers.

As for the President himself -- he was chief speaker today at a senior seminar of the State Department Foreign Service School. There telling a group of career diplomats -- that the world "stands balanced between high danger and rare opportunity." What with mounting problems in Southeast Asia, Africa -- and elsewhere across the globe.
