ZAMBEZI

Rhodesian Prime Minister Ian Smith - conferring with a dozen members of Rhodesia's African National Council. The site of their meeting on the border-line between Rhodesia and Zambia - to prevent any tricks. But what, if anything, they've accomplished so far - it's hard to say. When asked how the talks were going - Smith saying: "Well they're going."

ATHENS

The death sentences of former Greek dictator George Deo Papadopoulos and two of his key aides - were commuted today to life intrisonment. This by order of the Greek government & leading to immediate protests by hundreds of leftist students at Athens University. A government spokesman insisting, however, the commutations were juntified. Adding that demonstrations against the Government's action - were merely aimed "at creating up heaval and causing political passions to flare." SEOUL

Defense Secretary James Schlesinger flew today to Seoul - where he plans to take respinse part in the eighthannual U S-South Korea security meeting. On arrival Ksaid the purpose of the meeting is to "discuss justwhat we need to do - to make our strength and**meeting** resolve so manifest" as to remove the threat of war. ROCKEFELLER

CHARLESTON

Hundreds of striking coal miners, whose wildcat walkout has paralyzed much of the coal industry paraded today through the streets of Charleston, West Virginia. This in defiance of a back to work order from a federal judge. The strikers pledging to continue their walkout - pending a settlement of local grievances. Also, tying up traffic and scuffling with police, but generally peaceful - and there were no arrests. DECATUR
