Nixon bravo! bravo! bravo! -Franco! Franco! "

Later, in the Plaza del Marques del Duero -Madrid's mayor presenting Mr. Nixon_Aa golden key to the city. Again - a thunder of bravos. This time, the President plunging into the crowd to me shake hands with the crowd and there he was warmly embraced. President

calling it - "aa very **enimiting** exciting reception;" and the crowd said he "the largest I've ever seen."

DUBLIN FOLLOW MADRID

After Spain the President is heading next for Britain - then Ireland. The first - always a welcome stop; but the second - well, that's something else again.

Dublin authorities imposing today - the tightest security in Irish history. Banning all public demonstrations - also banning all public cars from downtown Dublin and Limerick. This in an attempt to head off protest movements - led by a coalition of anti-Vietnam war groups. Even Irish Quaker leaders # joining today in protesting the President's visit. CAIRO

The passing of Egypt's President Nasser - the frenzy of his funeral - now a man matter of history. Thus in Cairo loday - a return to the business of the living. Visiting Soviet Premier Kosygin conferring with Egypt's acting President - Anwar El-Sadat - also, the former Premier Aly Sabry. These seen as the top contenders - to concern succeed Nasser. Kosygin having already pledged Russia's full support - both economically and militarily - whoever wins out.

ADD CAIRO

Later on, official US representatives at Nasser's funeral - also conferring with the two top Egyptian leaders. Telling them the US considers alleged Egyptian cease fire violations - as the "principal obstacle" to resuming Mid-East peace talks. However, the Egyptians, it seems chiefly concerned with complaining about the proposed sale of US warplanes to Israel. BAKU FOLLOW CAIRO

In the meantime, Soviet Communist party leader Brezhnev - travelling to the city of Baku on the Caspian Sea. There helping to celebrate - the fiftieth anniversary of the Soviet Republic of Azerbaijan. He also charged in a major speech that - "Israeli ruling circles - with the support of the 71 S government - are doing everything possible to wreck" the current U N peace effort in the Middle East.

TEL AVIV FOLLOW BAKU

Reverse side - Tel Aviv. Israeli Premier Golda Am Meier addressing her own nation today - on the occasion of the Jewish New Year. Asserting once more that Israel is ready to resume peace talks under UN auspices - just as soon as 'Egyptian cease-fire She violations have been rectified. also disclosed that Israel had been ready to intervene in Jordan - if King Hussein had lost out in his struggle with Arab Guerrillas. Madame Meier adding that, in 🛤 musk any event - Israel becomes stronger militarily and economically each year; which brings it closer each year - said she - to peace with the Arabs.
