WATERGATE

In today's episode of the Watergate bugging affair -John Mitchell tells all. The former Attorney General testifying before a Federal grand jury in Washington. And then - a brief encounter with reporters.

Asked whether he still denied any prior knowledge of the Watergate caper - Mitchell saying: "I have done that twice - and I did it again today." Asked whether he had ever attended meetings where bugging proposals were made - Mitchell saying: "No such operations were ever approved by me - under any circumstances."

Next - a question suggesting the possible payment of "hush money" - to convicted Watergate defendants to keep them quiet. Mitchell saying: "I have never met any of the defendants - I have never met any of their counsel - and I never handled any such money." Elsewhere in Washington - President Nixon was conferring at length with his Cabinet. The main topics of discussion - listed officially as energy problems and domestic legislation.

The President and Mrs. Nixon, daughters Julie and Tricia, and son-in-law David Eisenhower - Later Key Biscayne. For what it's worth, the President also taking along - his personal secretary and White House Press Secretary Ron Ziegler; but not his Chief of Staff - H.R. "Bob" Haldeman - who normally accompanies the President on such trips.

The White House explaining that Haldeman remained in Washington - so he could spend the Easter holiday with his family.) Others were quick to note, however, that he, too - has now been implicated in the Watergate scandal. Adding that his future as the President's top aide - could well be in doubt.

HONOLULU

From the U.S. Pacific Forces Command in Honolulu -

a report today disclosing the loss of a U.S. Air Force

Phantom jet over Cambodia. Its two crewmen - listed as

missing in action.

HANOI

A related item: Hanoi charging today - that the U.S. has now resumed reconnaissance flights over North Vietnam. The U.S. firing right back - with a statement of its own; accusing the Communist side - of selective compliance with the terms of the Vietnam cease-fire. Adding, in effect, that full compliance, if and when - would quickly be met in kind.

UNITED NATIONS

Here in New York - at the United Nations - another attempt today at a Mideast compromise. Britain and France agreeing to drop from a Security Council draft resolution an implied threat against Israel. This in order to prevent an American veto - except that now they're saying it could lead to a Communist Chinese veto.

A vote on the draft resolution - was again delayed, however. Egypt demanding a full review of U.S. Mideast peace efforts - prior to final action. Next session tomorrow at ten.

JER USA LE M

Good Friday in the Holy Land - was again the most solemn of occasions today; with an estimated twenty-five thousand Christian pilgrims - bearing wooden crosses through the streets of Jerusalem; following the same path as that of Christ - en route to Mount Calvery, where He was finally crucified.

The safety/sanctity of the Christian procession insured by Israeli troops stationed all the way. An Israeli officer saying: "We are watching for anything and everything - including guerilla activity."

VATICAN FOLLOW JERUSALEM

In Rome, meanwhile - Pope Paul was enacting another age-old rite. Walking shoeless and hatless - down the main aisle at St. Peter's Basilica; there kissing a crucifix - in symbolic mourning for Christ.

The Pope later bearing a wooden cross - at the head of a torchlight procession of thousands. Past the Colosseum - the site of ancient Christian martyrdom; **•** to Palatine Hill - where thousands more awaited his blessing.

PRICES

The U.S.cost of living index - was up sharply last month; according to government figures announced today a resounding nine-tenths of one per cent; the greatest monthly increase - in twenty-two years. In the words of AFL-CIO President George Meany - "proof positive of the complete failure of the economic policies of the Nixon Administration." Chairman Herbert Stein of the President's Council of Economic Advisers - was, nevertheless, undisturbed. Indeed - just the opposite; noting that most of the March increase - was caused by sharp climb in meat prices, which have since been placed under a ceiling. Stein adding that today's report thus "contains the first encouraging signs

we have seen on prices - in the past two months."

MOSCOW

Moscow - a group of seven visiting American students staged a demonstration today - outside the Soviet visa office. The students protesting Soviet emigration policies - pertaining to Jews; in the process, chanting "liberty, liberty" - and singing songs such as "Let My People Go."

The protest had been on just a few minutes, however when police arrived. The students -submitting to arrest without resistance. They were held a few hours - and then released. NEW DELHI

Two of America's top diplomats stopped in today at New Delhi - as part of a tour of U.S. overseas diplomatic posts. Deputy Secretary of State Kenneth Rush and Assistant Secretary Joseph Sisco - bearing a personal message from President Nixon; which they delivered to India's Prime Minister Indira Gandhi - at a meeting this afternoon. Rush telling newsmen: "There is clearly a mutual desire - to find a more realistic basis for improved U.S.-Indian relations."


While this was going on - about a mile away, at the U.S. Embassy, about a thousand persons staging a mass protest march. The demonstrators waving a huge banner that said: "Yankees, stop arms to Pakistan." NEW YORK

For visiting Italian Prime Minister Giulio Andreotti a brief visit to New York; followed by his departure today - en route to the Pacific.

Before he left though - Andreotti sending "warm wishes" to all Americans of Italian descent. He also said: "It is fine to see the quality of our people - their great loyalty to the United States" - while still retaining "affection for the country of their families."
