CONGRESS

The Senale gave President Nixon a clear-cut victory today by voting - fifty-three to forty-five - in favor of expanding the Safeguard anti - Ballistic missile system. Thus, ABM opponents failed in their second and final attempt to confine deployment of the missile system to two sites in North Dakota and Montana. A third and fourth site now can be added.

Also, today, anti-war Senators - hoping to win new support - revised their proposed "amendment to end the war". The new proposal would cut off all Federal funds for the war at the end of Nineteen Seventy-One. Previously, the proposal called for cutting off funds at the end of this year. Sponsors say they hope to get a vote before Labor Day on this amendment to a twenty billion dollar military

procurement bill.

SCHOOLS

For the first time the federal government

used a new rule - designed to discourage contributions - contributions to private schools for white students only. It revoked the tax-exempt status of eleven private schools in Minx Mississippi. The Internal Revenue service announced the action taken when the schools refused to change their admission policy. Under the ruling, tax deductions would be disallowed for gifts to these eleven. schools.

President Nixon has the distinction of being the most "written to" President in our history. According to a recent compilation he received more than four and a half million letters and cards and nearly half a million telegrams during the first eighteen months of his administration. This total of nearly five million messages is more than President Butght Eisenhower received during his an entire eight years in the White We hear And, the volume is increasing. So far in Nineteen House. Seventy alone President Nixon has received nearly two million messages - more than any previous President ever received in an entire year. The reason more for all this mail? (Most of the comments on his policies one way or another.) White House aides say it's because he's more candid en in explaining the complex situations facing the nation - going on television more frequently and outlining his policies in greater detail than his predecessors - thereby sparking more reaction through the mails.

SKY NET

An American rocket carried Britain's sky net military communications satellite into orbit from Cape Kennedy today - enroute to a radio period relay outpost high above the Indian Ocean. When the satellite reaches its final "parking place" in stationary orbit next month, it will open hundreds of new and reliable radio channels for Die Britain's Armed Forces - especially between the Atlantic and the Far East. HAIR CUT

The Prime Minister of Singapore, Lee Kuan Yew, thought he was headed for Malaysia today on a state visit. Then he found out his visit was cancelled by the Malaysian government - all because Singapore police gave hair cuts to three young Malaysian hippies. Lee Kuan Yew even said he would send three the wigs to the victims if that would help, situation. The three Malaysians were arrested Friday night in an open air restaurant. They complained that police kept them sixteen sixteen hours and trimmed their long hair to within an inch of their scalp - charging each DRED one Singapore dollar for the unwanted service.

Four girls - who sayf they were fired by the New York Playboy Club for losing their "bunny" image" have asked the <u>equal employment commission</u> to have them reinstated in their jobs. The girls charge that firing a woman for reasons that wouldn't be used to fire a male employee, constitutes • sexual discrimination and violates federal law. DRUGS

The Pentagon revealed today that four Air Force officers and two sergeants were arrested on drug charges at Castel Base near Merced, California a Strategic Air Command base used by the nuclear armed B-52s. After the arrests - made last year - five of the suspects were found innocent but the sixth, pleading guilty to selling marijuana and L S D - spent three months in a civilian jail. At the time, none of the six was assigned to flight crews. The Pentagon released the information after a Senator expressed concern that airmen might be under the influence of drugs while flying planes earry Loaded with nuclear bombs.

STORM

Tropical Storm <u>Dorothy</u> - with sixty-five mile and hour winds -- is moving **man** westward in the Atlantic, posing an immediate threat to the Leeward Islands. SUPERSONIC

A Joint House-Senate Committee & warning , that the cost might spiral to three billion dollars - Cha strongly recommended that the Federal Government no longer spend money on the supersonic transport plane. The proposed SST would carry about three hundred passengers at eighteen hundred miles an hour three times the speed of sound. But critics say its sonic boom would limit its use to over-water flights only. A committee member who disagrees with his colleagues -Congressman Clarence Brown of Ohio - says - "if the committee had advised Queen Isabella, we would still be in Barcelona waiting for proof that the world is round before daring to cross the Atlantic."
