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Defense Secretary Robert McNamara is preparing to leave Washington tonight on a flight to Saigon - his ninth trip to the war zone in the past six years. Although the Pentagon says he will review all aspects of the war. the most serious question facing him concerns how many more American troops will be needed, for combat action-At present, there are four hundred sixty six thousand American servicemen in Viet Nam; and General Westmoreland er commander there says substantial increases above that figure are required to prosecute the war. The big problem is that Westmoreland wants to increase the troop strength as soon as possible and That would require calling up some reserves. Any buildup involving reserve forces would be comething more than a simple military question. It becomes *political; question of highest runk. not to mention the effect a new troop buildup will have on defense spending, the national economy, and taxes which the administration says will have to be raised anyway.

Democratic Senator William Proxmire of Wisconsin has taken sides with Republican Senators who argue that Congress must reduce federal spending rather than raise taxes to head off inflation. Proxmire takes issue with Gardner Ackley -- President Johnson's chief economic achier told Congress last week that a tax increase was the only real answer. He said Congress is either unwilling be or unable to cut federal spending any further. There is growing speculation in Washington that the President will ask Congress to increase taxes after it resumes its sessions on July Tenth.

A new civil war broke out in the Congo today when unidentified foreign mercenaries captured the airports at the provincial capitals of Kisangani and Bakavu after heaving fighting. Congolese President Joseph Mobutu declared the nation in a state of emergency, charging that the mercenaries - whose nationality he didn't disclose - had attacked loyal Congolese troops in what he termed "imperialist aggression." The outbreak of fithing fighting apparently came in retaliation for the kidnapping of former Premier Moise Tshombe who is being held in Algeria pending action on a Congolese demand for his extradition. Tshombe - who had been living in exile in Spain -- is necessary under a death sentence in the Congo on a charge of treason.

U N Secretary General U Thant has called on Israeli Foreign Minister Eban to fine give a quick reaction to the General Assembly's resolution which would nullify Israel's annexation of the old city of Jerusalem. The Assembly approved the resolution last night by a rote of ninety-nine to nothing - with the United States among the abstainers. The quickest reaction, however, came from Israel's Defense Minister - General Moshe Dayan - who said his country should keep not only Jerusalem but the Gaza Strip as well.

In Rome, the Vatican strongly criticized the annexation and demanded that the entire city be internationalized. The statement was issued as King Hussein of Jordan arrived in Rome for talks with Italian leaders on the Middle East situation;—— and also a private audience with Pope Paul.

COLD WAVE

A mid-summer cold wave hit the entire eastern half of the nation today - sending the temperatures to record lows for this date. The reading fell to fifty in Chicago -- breaking a record low of fifty-two recorded there in Eighteen-Seventy-Two. But it was still the good ole summertime in the southwest and on the west coast where everybody was trying to get out of the extreme heat.
