# RUSSIA LT-Delco. Tues. apr. 17-156

Middle East. The Foreign Ministry in Moscow, issuing a statement - saying that the Arab-Israeli dispute should be settled within the framework of the United Nations. The statement, denounces other nations who interfere; - obviously a reference to /merica, and the other nations of the West.

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The Moscow Minus says that U.N. action should be supported - and that the Kremlin is willing to throw its influence behind the Hammarskjold mission.

Dulles was asked how he felt about the soviet announcement that Russia will support the United Nations in the attempt to
settle the Middle East crisis. He Dulles replied that he
would welcome any sincere move by the Kremlin. But he added,
he learned from experience to read the fine print in Soviet
pronouncements. In other words, he wants a good look at the
text of the Moscow declaration - before he gives his opinion.

Secretary Dulles pointed out that the & Secretary General of the U.N. probably cannot arrive at a broad settlement of the Middle East situation during this trip. His real purpose is to calm the tension, and end the shooting - and Secretary Dulles believes that Hammatskjold has made a good start.

Our Secretary of State adding, he doesn't believe that there will be a war between Israel and the Arab nations in the immediate future.

#### ISRAEL

The Secretary General of the United Nations met for two hours with the Premier of Israel today. Dag Hammarskjold and Ben-Gurion, trying to work out an agreement. No communique was issued. But reliable sources say Ben-Gurion is pressing for a wider area of agreement between Israel and Egypt, while the Secretary General is more concerned about the immediate crisis. However, the Israeli Premier did promise that there would be no attacks on the Egyptians - as long as Cairo doesn't attack Israel.

Tomorrow Khrushchev and Bulganin will start their tour of Britain. During those ten days, the British police will impose security precautions never before seen in peace time. These are violently anti-Communist. the Eden government is taking great pains to see that nothing happens to Ehrushchev and Bulganin - when they arrive at Portsmouth, aboard a Soviet cruiser. the entire dockyard will be sealed off. Victoria Station - only authorized persons will be

allowed close to the platform. When the two Soviet

Hotel - which will seal off the staircase leading to

their floor. Other guests, at this ultra-conservative
British hotel, to use the elevators. Detachments of
Bobbies and plain clothes Scotland Yard men will be on
guard at the hotel all the time. In addition to the
Russian police - that is the fourteen men of the
bodyguards they bring along.

### HERBERT HOOVER

Here are some vivid remarks - by a man who with the years becomes more and more brilliant as a writer and speaker. In an address before the Inter-A merican Bar Association, at Dallas, Texas, remarked: - Here are his words: "In the last month, the men in the Kremlin have turned Stalin's face violently to the wall. Their next step to righteousness, " he add, "would be - to give us the names and addresses of all Stalin's collaborators in the Western Hemisphere."

Well, that would be a good idea - considering the characters in this country, who joined in the worship of the murderous tyrant.

Then Herbert Hoover goes on with a beguiling supposition. Noting - that, while the Stalin idol is out in the land of the Soviets, the worship of Marx remains. "The picture of Karl Marx," observes the former President, "still appears everywhere in Russia - in place of religious ikons.

Possibly," he goes on, "the Russians have not read Karl Marx's writings very attentively." Then adda Wr. Hoover:

"In his letters to his friend, Engels, in January,
Eighteen Sixty-Nine, Marx said: 'I do not trust any Russian.'
Also he said: "As soon as a Russian worms his way in, all hell
breaks loose.'"

"Possibly, in time," the ex-President remarks "the Russians will discover that they invented Socialism, prior to Marx - and will turn his picture to the wall also."

In London, it's announced that the British government is coming up with something new - a national lottery. Until now, the British have never used gambling as a source of direct income. It has always collected income tax on the income of bookies - but the government has never used gambling itself.

But the financial crisis is still severe. And now Chancellor of the Exchequer, Harold MacMillan, says he will introduce a lottery - something like the one used by the Soviet Union. Under this system, government bonds will not pay interest. Instead, bond numbers will be drawn in a lottery every) three months - and the interest that normally would be \to everybody holding bonds paid will be shared among the winners instead. MacMillan says that prizes will go as high as one thousand pounds for a bond costing one pound. The Chancellor adds that no real gambling is involved - because the subscriber cannot lose. He gets back his principal - and stakes only the interest. But it still amounts to a national lottery - the first one
