BIG FOUR

After two weeks of discussions in London, the ·Big Four Foreign Ministers today finally agreed on scaething. They all consented to take up proposals made by British, French and Russians for the economic future of Germany. With Molotov repeating that the western nations are dividing Germany, especially the Ruhr; preparing the Ruhr as a strategic base for the purpose of establishing domination in Europe. He repeated his charges that the British and Americans are violating the Potsdam Agreement. Also that it is not right for the Big Four to modify the Potsdam Agreement, since that was made by the chiefs of state. Foreign Ministers, said Molotov, could not alter any decisions made by chiefs of state.

He also repeated the Soviet demand for ten billion dollars in reparations from Germany. However, he made a slight concession, the previous demand being that this sum must be awarded to Russia before attempting any general agreement. Today, he waived

that part of the agreement.

In France, the Communists today tried to call a strike of civil service workers and employees of the Paris subway, and failed. It was such a fizzle that at eleven this morning it was called off; and in the meantime service in the sub way hadn't even slowed down. In Paris itself, buses continued to run even though the Communists were scattering nails all over the streets and boulevards.

So it looks as though the fight in France is not between workers and government, or workers and employers. It's between workers and Communists. Such successes as the Reds have had, have been due to intimidation of workers, who, it now develops, are reluctant to strike.

The Schuman government today sent ten thousand troops, with tanks, into the coal fields, whereupon the miners who had been kept away from their jobs by Communist commando squads, streamed back to the pits.

And the same is reported in the railroad strike at the port of St. Nazaire, and at Renn.

As for the strike of civil servants which the Gommunists wanted so badly, one department issued a statement that the entire strike movement has been unjustified.

A week ago there were two million idle in France.

Today this has dwindled to less than a million.

The Vatican is worried. Fearful lest differences between the two great powers, Russia and the U.S.A., may lead to a new conflict. A high dignitary of the Church says the general outlook for peace is not as good as it was a year ago. That the Pope and his counsellors fear Europe is being irrevocably divided.

Virgil Pinkley, European head of the United Press.

Communists in Rome today announced a first step toward organizing a military force to implement the schemes of the Comminform, successor to the Commintern.

Present at the meeting was General Kovpak, VicePresident of the Okraine. When one of the comrades
suggested the organization of an international brigade
such as the Communists had during the civil war in Sapin,
General Kovpak replied that Russia would be much in
favor of that. Indeed it would be indispensible, said he.

What about the Arabs and Jews today? We hear that one Joshua Globerman, a leader of Haganah, is the latest victim of an ambush. Globerman was driving, in a motor convoy with an armed escort, from Jerusalem to Tel Aviv, down the famous old Jaffa-Jerusalem Road. Becoming immine impatient may be drove ahead of the escort. At a crossroads he saw what was ahead, and tried to turn back. But a stream of machine gun bullets riddled him.

Cloberman, we are told, was on his way to take over command of the Palestinian coastal plain between Tel Aviv and Petah Tikva, into which half the Jewish population of the MR Holy Land is crammed. The plan was for Haganah to replace British and Arab police who have been in control there.

Tomorrow a census of all young Jewish men and women, for possible military and police duty, will be taken. The Hebrew defense force wants seventy-five thousand more recruits.

In a late dispatch from Cairo, a high Arab soucre is quoted as saying that the Arabs in Palestine -- will attack in each area as it is evacuated by the British and handed over to the Jews. The creation of a Jewish state.

The Arab "high command," as it terms itself, not waiting for final evacuation but attacking each place as the British evacuate.

Meanwhile, at Lake Success, Egypt and Tebanon toright requested the U. N. Security Council to let them participate in the impending Council debate on the U. N. plan for the partition of the Holy Land. An interesting move which seems to reverse Arab statements previouly made that the Arab block will take no part in the debate but engage in a Holy War.

The leaders of the seven Arab nations -- Prime
Ministers, Foreign Ministers and other high officials,
met today in Cairo. Representatives of Egypt, Syria,
Lebanon, Iraqu, Transjordan, Saudi Arabia and Yemen; with
the avowed purpose of canvassing the possibilities of
starting a war to prevent the partitioning of Palestine.

Among them, of course, Amin El Huessini, Tormer Grand Mufti of Jerusalem, who says the Arab peoples must draw the sword and put the pencil back in its case.

He added that he never felt more hopeful or more confident in all his life.

His arrival, we hear, created a sensation in the Egyptian capital. The story is that he was Prime

Minister Samir el Rifai Pasha of Transjordania announced that his country's forces will be allied with the rest of the Arab world in defense of Palestine. Which may mean a good deal, since Transjordania has the best equipped, the best trained army of all states.

The session got under way with a dinner given by Azzam Pasha, Secretary General of the -eague.

From Baghdad came stories telling of the opening of recruiting centers in Iraq; this headed by the former Chief-of-Staff of the Iraqi army, Emir Zeyd, youngest brother of Emir Feisal, who created modern Iraqu. Not to be confused with the Emir Feisal, chief delegate from Saudi Arabia to the United Nations, who also is expected to reach Cairo from the United States tomorrow.

One interesting topic of the day is the return of

The other night on this program I told how five years ago, at the Advertising Club of New York, we had a gathering of prominent men, who each gave a forecast of events in this world. Each gave his opinion of things to come, and not one of us mentioned the atom. None of us prophets, five years ago. foresaw any hint of atomic developments soon to come - although. at that same hour, a crucial experiment leading to the atomic bomb was performed at Chicago. Well, I told that the other night as a joke on our elves. So, what must I do tonight? Why plunge into prophecy again, make another forecast - and again it's the Ad Club of New York which incites this latest bit of crystal gazing.

That peerless organization is about to lay the cornerstance of a new building, to be its new home, and the plan is to seal a tube of predictions, various people contributing their ideas about the state of the world in the Year Two

Thousand and Four. That will be the Hundredth Anniversary of the Advertising Club, when the tube of prophecy will be opened.

They've asked me to make my contribution to the forecast, and I guess I'll have to do it - in spite of my confession of how we failed to foresee the atomic era, when gazing into the crystal ball five years ago.

There's no discouraging a prophet! So, here goes:-

First of all, about that same atomic era. My guess is, that in Two Thousand and Four, the industries of the world will be run largely by atomic power. I think there'll be great atomic energy plants, from which electrical power will be transmitted to run factories and transportation. The amount of manual labor needed in this world will be much less, fewer workers in the old sense of the term - more and more people pushed up into the middle class to do greater numbers of highly skilled tasks in a more elaborate civilization.

On the political and social side, I feel that our present western system of political freedom will be increased and expanded, worldwide - and that the business of the world will still be based on private initiative, in collaboration

with unions of employees, much more highly developed than at present - all this regulated by a noble morality of social responsibility for the welfare of human beings.

In religion, I believe that Christianity will rise to new heights, in creating the moral tone for scientific, political and industrial advancement. I believe there will be far greater unity among the various branches of Christianity. I don't think this will come through any formal amalgamation, but through an understanding of how thoroughly alike they are in their fundamental beliefs - as compared, for example, with the tyranny and brutality of totalitarianism.

All this may seem optimistic, but I foresee a few blotches in the pretty picture too. Probably there won't be any jitterbugging, but likely enough there'll be something worse. Fashions will still be changing in a weird and wonderful way, and the hats the ladies wear will be still more peculiar. Marriage will still be classed as a pitched battle. Wives, even with all the wonderful new gadgets, will still burn the toast,

and husbands will be grouchy at breakfast.

And my final prophecy is this -- in Two Thousand and Four, the prophets will still be prophesying, and they'll be wrong, as usual.
