Echoes of the election can still be heard - in the news. The counting of returns - still going on. Nixon still having a slim chance - to win a popular majority. And even yet - he's not mathematically beaten. Republican chairman Thruston Morton is pushing for recounts in several places.

Down in Mississippi - they have special problem.

The state's eight electors - are unpledged. Meaning - they

are free to vote as they see fit. Yoday they met, and

decided to postpone their choice - until the final election

tabulation is in. They say they re especially anxious to

see the final result - in Illinois and California.

President Elect Kennedy spent most of his time today answering congratulatory messages - before leaving for Florida. More than thirteen thousand telegrams have been pouring into the Western Union Office - at Hyannis; signed by - some of the great names of this era: Dwight D. Eisenhower, Prime Minister MacMillan, President DeGaulle, Chancellor Adenauer, Prime Minister Menzies of Australia, Pope John, Richard Nixon and so on, and so on, and so on.

The Kennedy office today released his answer to

Adenauer. The President-elect pledges to work for

controlled disarmament - stressing the word "controlled",

and adds that he intends to cooperate with the West

German Chancellor as far as possible.

After getting his formal replies out of the way Mr.Kennedy went to the airport with Mrs.Kennedy and their
daughter Caroline. They flew directly to Washington - where

Mrs. Kennedy got off to consult her doctor.

The President elect, continuing on to Florida - and a two weeks' vacation.

And, Vice President Nixon is in Florida - resting up after his strenuous bid for the presidency. What will his future be? Will it lie in the realm of politics, or law? Or both? He merely says he'll announce his decision when he makes it.

Meanwhile, some California Republicans are hoping he will stay in politics. In fact they are asking him to run for Governor of their state - in Nineteen Sixty-Two.

They point out that as Governor of California he would be in just about the right spot again to go
after presidential nomination in Mineteen Sixty Four.

The U N has agreed to postpone the immediate elections to the Security Council. The vote is - a defeat for the West. A victory - for the African and Soviet blocs.

The point is that the new African states www want to marshall support for - a security council seat for Africa.

Meanwhile, from the Congo - more reports of jungle fighting between the Balubas and U N troops. While in Leopoldville, U N guards had to fire warning shots - to break up a battle gm between Congolese civilians and the Congolese army.

The latest rioting in Algiers - was expected.

Armistice Day is traditionally the time when Right Wing

Frenchmen demonstrate - in favor of a French Algeria.

Now they've got a special motive - agitating against

DeGaulle and his plan for an Algerian Algeria.

So km what happened today - came as no surprise.

Least of all - to DeGaulle.

The President of France ordered riot police and special army units into Algiers - to maintain order during the Armistice Day parade. They succeeded - but not without a lot of violence. Thousands of French settlers flocked to Algiers - and began to scream, "Algeria is French - DeGaulle to the gallows!"

They surged against the police line - and battles erupted all over the square, and in the side streets.

Scores are reported injured tonight - and many under arrest. Algiers, tense - with the authorities on the lookout for more trouble.

One casualty of today's fighting - the American information center in Algiers. A mob burst into the building, wrecked the interior, smashed furniture, burned books and pamphlets - and left a mass of km debris behind.

In Paris, DeGaulle is standing firm. Saying-he won't be deterred from pushing awar ahead with his plan for Algeria. He still intends to settle this problem by a free vote -- of all the people in that great North African territory.

The news from Viet Nam and Laos - emphasizes

the critical condition of southeast Asia. The reason
Red China, supporting Communist revolutions throughout the

area. As Mao Tse-Tung, menacing free governments - through

his puppet guerrillas. The revolts in both Viet Nam and

Laos - are intended to forestall Communist take-overs of

those two countries.

The coup in Viet Nam was led by paratroop Colonel Nguyem Chan Thi - who km accuses Premier Diem of weakening the Viet Nam econony. successful Red revolution. The Colonel led his ma men into Saigon - where they occupied the city after savage fighting, and besieged Diem in the Royal Palace. still could reply on his palace guards - and he sent orders to his armored columns outside Saigon to come to his aid. The tanks - were too far away. The palace guards - too few. With allof Saigon in the hands of his enemies - Diem had no alternative but to surrender. Monight Viet Nam has a new strong man - Nguyem Chan Thi.
