At the White House The colorful ceremony; with a band of Indian chiefs in full tribal dress - serving as witnesses as President Nixon signed into law a new bill. This finally giving to the Taos Pueblo Indians - legal title to their sacred Blue Lake; also, forty-eight thousand acres of New Mexico real estate which surrounds it; ending a dispute - that began sixty four years ago.

President Nixon - who specifically requested the new law - observing that a grave "injustice was done;" but the government has now "started on a new road" - said he . with regard to Indian affairs. Taos elder Juan De Jesus ninety - responding for his fellow Indians, and saying this marks the beginning of "a new day - not only for the Indians, but for all Americans." And he added: "The President of the United States - is the greatest father we have. "

On the space front—— Soviet attempt today to achieve a soft-landing on the planet Venus. This—— According to the Soviet News Agency Tass; which said that Russia's unmanned Venus-Seven—— completed a hundred—and—twenty—day flight from earth; and then—parachuted toward the surface of Venus.

The spacecraft's subsequent descent—taking about thirty-five minutes—we hear; during which time—the ship radioed back certain information; whereupon it was apparently crushed—by the tremendous pressure of the familiar atmosphere. This was the same fate that befell three earlier Soviet Venus probes.

But the fact that Venus-Seven nearly made it-that in itself "an unprecedented achievement"--says
Moscow.

In the city of Saigon - a series of sudden terrorist attacks today; including the bombing of a hotel housing U.S. officers - also, the attempted burning of two U.S. jeeps; leaving at least four injured.

These attacks - said to have been sparked - by
the shooting of the young Vietnamese last week at Qui Nhon;
the boy in question - attempting to rob a truck. The U.S.
soldier who shot him has since been charged with negligent homicide.

Here on our own shores - a Pentagon press conference today. Defense Secretary Melvin Lairi predicting that U.S. troop strength in Vietnam - will be cut to less than two hundred and eighty-four thousand by May One; thereby exceeding again - the President's previously-announced withdrawal timetable. Moston Laird noting that enemy operation have been concentrated lately - in Laos and Cambodia South Vietnam.

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For Vice President Spiro Agnew - a trip today to Chicago; where he applauded President Nixon's decision of last Spring - sending Meusand of American troops into Cambodia. This a "hard decision" to make - said the Vice President; but one that "served exactly the purposes - that President Nixon said it would;" destroying "vest amounte of armaments and supplies - which the enemy had planned to use against us."

Spiro Agnew then observing that "anybody who looks at the casualty lists - knows that the Cambodian Operation saved American and South Vietnamese lives." "In addition" - said he - "it has also permitted us to proceed with the Vietnamization paicy - which thus far is going well."

The White House again - President Nixon unveiled today a new "GNP Clock", so-called; a device ticking off

-- an
minute-by-minute estimate of the nation's Gross National Product for Nineteen-Seventy; which reached this noon - a record One Trillion Bucks.

The President observing: 'This is the first Trillion-Dollar economy - in the history of the world." And "our objective" - said he - "is to keep it moving even faster in the years ahead." Even as he spoke - the clock adding on another Five Million.

At the Hague in the Netherlands - an agreement at floor last; to agreement at two weeks of wrangling - at an international conference on air law. Delegates representing seventy-seven nations - finally approving a convention demanding "severe penalties" for air hijachers; also specifying - there shall be no exceptions for political reasons. The new pact to take effect - as soon as it is retified by ten member nations.

Only trouble - Cuba boycotting the conference - along all this - with several Arab nations. So the effects of the conference - along all this - at best, doubtful.

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This next - from the University of California at Davis; where a real-life chicken expert is attempting to introduce here in the U.S. - a new breed of chicken; I mean, a really fancy, schmancy chicken - with a tail that
