GOOD EVENING EVERYBODY: - TODAY WAS THE DAY OF DAYS HERE AT THE WINTER OLYMPICS, THE DAY OF THE BIG DOWN MOUNTAIN SKI RACE THAT WILL BE WRITTEN ABOUT FOR YEARS TO COME. FOR A LONG, LONG TIME SKIERS WILL TALK ABOUT FEB. 22ND., 1960, THE DAY THE TEN YEAR REIGN OF THE AUSTRIAN CHAMPIONS CAME TO A DRAMATIC END. THE NEW KING TONIGHT -- A FRENCHMAN', 27 YEAR OLD JEAN VUARNET, WHO IS BOTH A TOP ATHLETE AND AN INTELLECTUAL: A LAWYER AND AN AUTHOR OF SEVERAL BOOKS.

IN FACT THERE WASN'T AN AUSTRIAN IN THE FIRST SIX TO COME HURTLING DOWN FROM THE TOP OF SQUAW PEAK, ALMOST TO THE VALLEY FLOOR: THE NEARLY TWO MILE COURSE ON WHICH WILLY SCHAEFFLER AND HIS MEN HAVE BEEN WORKING FOR A YEAR OR MORE TO MAKE IT A SUPREME TEST OF BOTH COURAGE AND SKILL. WHEN THE RACE ENDED, THE WINNER, JEAN VUARNET, SAID THAT ALTHOUGH IT WAS NOT QUITE AS PRECIPITOUS AS SOME DOWN MOUNTAIN COURSES IN THE ALPS, IT WAS IN HIS OPINION, THE TRICKIEST, MOST DIFFICULT COURSE IN THE HISTORY OF THE WINTER OLYMPICS.

HIS TIME FOR THE NEAR TWO MILE RUN DOWN SQUAW PEAK: TWO MINUTES AND SIX SECONDS. THAT MEANS TRAVELLING AT 70 MILES AN

AN HOUR ON SOME STRETCHES.IT WAS A GREAT DAY FOR THE FRENCH, TAKING BOTH FIRST AND THIRD, IN THIS WHICH IS REGARDED AS THE OUTSTANDING EVENT OF EVERY WINTER OLYMPICS. ALL THE SKATING EVENTS HAVE THEIR SPECIAL THRILLS. HOCKEY OF COURSE, OFTEN KEEPS THE SPECTATORS IN A WILD UPROAR, LIKE TODAY IN A FIERCE BATTLE BETWEEN THE RUSSIAN AND CZECH TEAMS. THE CZECHS GAVE IVAN HIS ROUGHEST BATTLE SO FAR, WITH RISSIA WINNING 8 TO 5. THE NORDICE CROSS COUNTRY - GRUELING SKI RACES, TEST MEN TO THE LIMIT OF THEIR ENDURANCE: AND THE WOMEN TOO. THE MEN AND WOMEN'S SLALOM AND GIANT SLALOM SKI RACE, ARE THRILLERS. SKI JUMPING FROM THE OLUMPIC HILL IS AS AWE-INSPIRING AS ANYTHING IN THE WORLD OF SPORT. BUT -- IT'S THE MEN'S ALL-OUT DOWN MOUNTAIN RACE THAT IS THE MOST DANGEROUS, THE MOST HAIR-RAISING OF ALL THAT GOES ON AT THE WINTER OLYMPICS. IT'S THE ULTIMATE. THE WINNER. IS THE KING. HIS FAME VIRTUALLY WORLD-WIDE. AND SO WE HAVE A NEW NAME TO CONJURE WITH IN THE SKI WORLD, JEAN VUARNET. TONIGHT HE WEARS THE CROWN THAT WAS WORN BY TONY SAILOR, ZENO COLO, EMILE ALLAIS AND OTHER DOWN MOUNTAIN CHAMPIONS OF THE PAST.

BUT A FRIEND OF MINE WAS STANDING BY ALLAIS AT THE FINISH, AND HE TELLS ME EMILE WAS IN TEARS. NO WONDER, FOR THIS WAS INDEED ONE OF THE MAJOR TRIUMPHS OF HIS LIFE. AND IT MUST HAVE BEEN ESPECIALLY REWARDED TO ALLAIS: FOR ONLY A FEW YEARS AGO HE WAS THE SKI MAESTRO HERE AT SQUAW VALLEY. HE HAD PLANNED MANY THINGS FOR THIS SNOWY SIERRA VALE. BUT ALLAIS HAD SOME DISAGREEMENTS WITH THE SQUAW AUTHORITIES. AND RETURNED TO THE FRENCH ALPS WHERE NOW HE IS THE WINTER HIGH MOGUL AT SPECTACULAR COUR CHEVALLES.

EISENHOWER

President Eisenhower is in - Puerto Aico, tonight. Flying from Washington to San Juan - accompanied by Secretary of State Herter, and a party including the President's son, Major John Eisenhower. In responding to the welcome by - Governor Munoz-Marin, President Eisenhower praised - Puerto Rico's political status. The island, a self-governing commonwealth - joined to the United States. The President, calling Puerto Rico -"totaly unique." Governor Munoz-Marin, pointed out that Puerto Rico could vote her own independence; but, the majority of Puerto Ricans prefer - their present relationship with the United States.

At San Juan Airport, heavily guarded, a few shouted slogans and waved anti-American banners. Most of the crowd of five thousand - chanted "we like Ike!" His next stop - Brazil.
