The condition of our national economy?

Prosperity - without serious inflation - says the Labor

Department.

The latter part of the statement - is the focus
of attention tonight. Experts have been worried about
higher wages - higher prices, and so on - up and up.

But the Labor Department says the rise in the cost of living is moderate. Last nonth - one tenth of one per cent. No - run away inflation.

The moonlight may be wonderful on the banks of the Wabash - but not the flood! minutes - according to General John Gerhart. Reserve
supplies - were quickly brought out. Motors - installed
Instruments - repaired. In the words of General
Gerhart - "we cranked up again in seven minutes."

The Dew Line operating again - seven minutes after the Alaska earthquake convulsed a large part of our Forty-ninth state.

Which reminds us: I wonder whether
Washington has forgotten Alaska?

The two Red giants are preparing - to celebrate May Day. They already ninsulting one another.

The Soviets began it - by extending an invitation to Peking. Then - withdrawing the invitation - the first time - this has be ever happened. One explanation of Khrushchev's faux pas - is that the satellite leaders urged him to be conciliatory toward Mao Tse Tung. They that Khrushchev got cold feet - after the invitation had gone out. Cold feet about the possible behavior - of a Red Chinese delegation in the Soviet capital. So he followed it with an invitation - for them to stay in Pehing.

not. Why - delicate? Because the boss of the Kremlin

obviously doesn't want - a war over Cuba. And he knows

that the U-2 flights are necessary - because of his

inability to persuade Castro to permit on-site inspection.

Here's another point:- The American Ambassada
to Moscow - has been discussing the Cuban problem with
Mikoyan. Castro complains - that the Russians have no
authority to speak for him. He said this at an Embassy
party in Havana - while looking directly at the Soviet
Ambassador.

The State Department has Castro's Cuba - and Castro's sugar - on its mind. For - a special reason. The bearded dictator is indulging in - some rather weird transactions on the world market.

Consider this - Castro, not selling - but huying sugar. Surreptitiously ordering twenty thousand tons - from European browns brokers. Paying - cash for it.

Secondly, Castro is "leaking" false estimates

- about the sugar harvest in Cuba. Underestimating

production - by about half a million tons. Blaming
heavy rains. But the Cuban rainy season was just average

this year - according to the Weather Bureau in Miami.

What's Castro - up to? Apparently he's trying predictions to raise - the price of sugar. His method - predictions of a shortage in the fall. His hope - a run on the market.

Clients, paying high - for his chief crop.

The loss of a ferry on Pakistan's Meghna
River - is the old story. The Ferry - overcrowded.

The River - deep.
