For the first time - President Johnson intervened

personally today in the air line tieup. Blocking a threatened

strike against American Airlines - for a period of at least sixty

days.

Shortly thereafter - the Senate Labor Committee began consideration of special legislation; designed to force an end to the three-week strike # that has already shut down five other major airlines.

However, Labor Secretary Willard Wirts - one of the first witnesses, Suggesting instead that Congress order Labor-Management negotiators - "back to the woodshed" as he put it; with a specific deadline - either to settle or else.

## GOLDWATER

Former Senator Barry Goldwater of Arisona - back on the stump today in Washington. Denouncing what he called - "the big lie technique," Alleggedly used by opponents - of two proposed dams in Arisona; one of which would form a huge lake - in the Grand Canyon.

Objections to the dams based - said Goldwater - "on one
of the greatest campaigns of misinformation I have ever encountered in or out of politics." The former Republican presidential nominee asserting that the dams would supply Arisona with badly needed
water. "Without" - said he - "without damnging in any way whatsoever the grandour and beauty of the campon."

A few hours later - the House Interior Committee rejected repeated attempts - to block or delay construction of the dams.

Final committee approval of the project now expected some time tomorrow.
