HUSSEIN

For two hours today - an electric meeting at the White House. Jordan's tough, young King Hussein - conferring with President Johnson; trying to find some common meeting ground -- that might lead to a settlement of the current mid=east crisis.

When it was all over - the White House conceding there were no agreements. Further stating "there was not an identity of views." Adding nonetheless - "the exchange proved to be of definite value."

Earlier, the President warning Israel against what he called - any "hasty, unilateral action" with regard to the captured city of Jerusalem. Arab powers also agreeing to appeal to the UN - toward the same end.

Be that as it may - later word that Israel ke had, indeed, annexed the old city of Jerusalem. Brawing immediate reaction - from Washington. The move - totally unacceptable - said the State Department. Adding that the

united States "has never recognized any such unitateral action" -- and won to now either.

In the meantime - an official finding at last today; in that Israeli attack June Eighth - on the US communications ship Liberty.

A Navy court of Inquiry ruling that the Liberty

was, quote - "in international waters - properly marked

as to her identity and nationality - and in calm, clear

weather, when she suffered an unprovoked attack - by

Israeli aircraft and motor torpedo boats." Killing thirty
four Americans - and wounding seventy-five.

The court further citing testimony -- suggesting the ship's flag may have been difficult to see - because the sea was so calm. The court observing, however, that the Liberty was under air surveillance no less three separate times / in the five hours immediately preceding the attack.

Even so - the court refusing to rule on what it called - "the culpability of the attackers." Noting that "no evidence was heard - from the attacking nation."

Violence flared anew today - in the British

Crown Colony of Aden. With British troops searching

adjoining Grob lity
for terrorists in the Arab town of Sheikh Othman - when

they came under fire from a machine gunner in a nearby
house.

The British - quickly firing by back. Later,
rushing the house - and finding a dead Arab beside the
machine gun. Also present though - another dead Arab
and two wounded companions. Apparently earlier victims
- of Aden's three-cornered war.

Elsewhere in Aden - Cairo-backed today

threatened a bloodbath over the kidnapping of thirteen of

their leaders last week - supposedly by rival Arab

Nationalities.

All this - prompting a hurried airlift from Britain; with which to

clamp the lid on an extremely explosive situation.

A later & report: Arab terrorists tonight
blowing up -- a British oil pipeline in the Aden harbor.
Starting a fire == eleavery visible for twenty-five miles.

MOSCOW

Speaking of violence - more of the same today in Moscow. This time - self-directed.

The victim - an unidentified elderly man who began haranguing a crowd hop near Lenin's tomb in Red Square - when suddenly he was blown to bits. Seems he was carrying a hand grenade - and it went off in his pocket.

But whether the blast as was accidental or on seems to purpose - nobody know for the Police learning from witnesses - only that the man was bitterly opposed - to the current cease-fire in the Middle East.

A related item -- from Paris. The story we've all been waiting for -- no doubt. DeGaulle's reaction today -- to that Glassboro summit meeting.

As quoted by his Information Minister -- DeGaulle saying he knew in advance the summit would produce no solid results. Adding that the Soviet-American talks -- only "pointed up a certain number of disagreements." DeGaulle concluding that "all this had been expected -- and was quite logical.

So says -- the man who wasn't there. Sour grapes --

The U.S. Atomic Energy Commission -- latest government agency to relax east-west trade restrictions. Ruling today that small quantities of certain radioactive materials -- may be sold freely, henceforth, to certain Communist countries.

The A.E.C. emphasizing that the materials in question -- have no military or strategic importance.

Adding that they will be "useful mainly -- in physical, biological, biochemical and life-science research."

Countries covered by the new rule -- Albania,
Bulgaria, Czechoslovakia, Estonia, Latuia, Lithuania,
Outer Mongolia and the Soviet Union. All of which will thus
enjoy the same trade privileges -- previously granted Poland
and Romania.

All that talk about a U.S. population explosion -may be just that: Talk. According to figures announced
today -- by the U.S. Census Bureau.

True enough -- the nation's population increased by another two-and-a-quarter million people last year. However, the U.S. rate of growth -- falling to one-point-five per cent of total population. Marking ten straight years -- of steady decline.

The causes -- we're told -- fewer immigrants coupled with a declining birth rate. American couples producing one hundred thousand fewer babies last year -- than they did the year before.

On the political front - a new order today from
the Saigon government, Fringspring Porbidding exiled
General Duong Van Minh -- from returning home from
Bangkok to run for President.

Looks, however, as if "Big Minh" - will be a hard man to convince. Indeed, he's quoted today as saying - he would prefer "jail in Vietnam - to life in Bangkok."
