He admits that future negotiations could turn the territory over to New Delhi - but as of now, Goa is andoubtedly a "Portuguese province" and have been for 400 yrs., since the days of St. Francis Xairer of Vasco de Gama and Offorso albueguerque.

KHRUSHCHEV

Tonight the British press is asking this question are Bulganin and Khrushchev trying to get the British government to cancel the visit scheduled for next Spring? When the first Hall of Fame selections were made, in Nineteen Thirty-Six - Wagner was a unanimous choice. Horus -

of all short-stops -- made only six hundred errors in twenty-one (although he handled the ball at least ten thousand times. seasons. He knew how to run the bases - stealing seven hundred and twenty during his career, six of them in the Nineteen Nine World Series against Detroit - a record equalled only once since. no was also one of the greatest hitters of all time.

After twenty-one years, he ended up with a batting average of three hundred and twenty-nine. He batted above three hundred, for seventeen consecutive years, and led the National League eight times. And that record was compiled in the era of the "dead ball" - in the days when there was no such thing as a

cheap home-run.

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And the "Flying Dutchman" also was durable - he perseason, played in at least one hundred games, for nineteen consecutive seasons. Although Hans Wagner set many records that still he was never paid more than ten thousand dollars a year. stand But he never grumbled about that - said he liked baseball so much, he would have played for nothing.
