Campaign 'Seventy-Two - getting rough; as campaigns usually do at the eleventh hour. McGovern today at a Washington conference of editors and publishers, departed from his prepared text - in order to unleash his harshest yet.

The nation is now deteriorating -said Senator

McGovern - under "the worst leadership in our history."

"Today" - he continued - "we face not merely the corruption

of government - but the corruption of America." "Our sacred

honor" - he went on - "is laid at the feet of dictators,

dope runners and gangsters in Saigon; a government" - said

he - "that subverts our ideals just as eagerly as it steals

our aid." He made no comment regarding the government

McGovern also challenged the validity of recent polls
- said to rate him as "untrustworthy and indecisive - a nonleader." "I make no apology" - said he - "for changing my
mind in the light of additional insights and additional

reflections." But "Mr. Nixon, in contrast" - said he "is a man of no constant principle except opportunism and
policitcal manipulation."

For the most part - it might be added - McGovern's remarks drew no applause - only polite silence.

Later in the day - Vice President Spira Agnew addressed the same audience. McGovern's charge against the President - said he "" a reckless allegation which shows a lack of maturity and self-discipline - and a lack of quality that a President should have."

The Vice President also called McGovern - a

victim of "myopic isolationism." Adding: "An America

governed by the foreign policy, advocated by the

opposition - would be weak in will and weak in way;" an

America - said he - that would "invite aggression."

The White House - President Nixon met for more than an hour today - with visiting Soviet Foreign Minister Andrei Gromyko. The topics they covered - said to have included "all outstanding matters" between the U.S. and Russia. The President also quoted as saying - the U.S. is now ready to start talks on mutual troop reductions in Europe.

Tonight at Camp David - the two men meeting again at a so-called "working dinner. And then - the back to the White House; where tomorrows a formal ratification of these new strategic arms limitations agreements.

TAXES FOLLOW WHITE HOUSE

The White House again - a strategy meeting with

House Republicans; aimed at backing the President's request

- for a Two Hundred and Fifty Billion-Dollar ceiling on

Federal spending.

Budget Director Casper Weinberger - later meeting with reporters. Restating the President's previous pledge - that he "does not plan to propose any new taxes next year;" value-added - or otherwise.

In the air war over Vietnam - a temporary lull today due to inclement weather. On the ground - Saigon troops reporting an even one hundred "enemy-initiated" incidents; the most for a single day - in more than five with the fighting still described - as "generally light."

HOUSE FOLLOW VIETNAM

Here at home - in the House - an attempt today to put through a so-called "Jane Fonda Bill;" one to ban travel to North Vietnam - or any other nation in armed conflict with the U.S. - without the expressed consent of the President. The bill getting a big plurality - but just short of a required two-thirds majority.

From the Soviet news agency Tass - an announcement today that Egypt's Premier will soon pay an official visit to Moscow. This, an invitation of the Kremlin, apparently the first step in a Kremlin move to rebuild its bridges with Cairo.

Yesterday in Belfast - Catholics and Protestants
took part in more than thirty joint religious services praying for an end to the killing.

But today - the same old story; bombings and shootings - one of which claimed the life of a British Army intelligence agent. The death toll in Northern Ireland - now nearly six hundred over the past three years.

In Belgium today - the butcher, the baker and the candlestick maker are on strike. Also, the corner grocer - the local restaurateur - in fact, all small shopkeepers, and in Belgium - this means one for every fifty Belgians.

All this a mass protest over excessive taxation and bureaucratic red tape, said to favor supermarkets and big departments and driving the small shopkeeper right out of business.
