IRAN-SOVIET

The Soviet Embassy in Teheran has entered a protest against the stories -- that the Russian Ambassador tried to commit suicide. The reports have been insistent and in precise detail, that Moscow Ambassador Lavrentiev shot himself - after he had been summoned home. All this, following the return of the Shah and the overthrow of Mossadegh, who had been supported by the Communist party in Iran.

Today the Soviet embassy demanded that the Iranian government prevent the circulation of what it called "untrue" stories. But, just the same, nobody is allowed to see the Ambassador. The Russians merely say that he is - sick in bed. All - mighty secret.

SUB GERMANY

Rioting broke out today along the frontier of West and East Germany. Fights between anti-Communist crowds and Reds crossing over to disrupt the West German elections on Sunday. Violence flaring along the border of the Iron Curtain.

The State Department says - the international council of Christian churches does not need the approval of the United States government - in sending Bibles by balloon into countries behind the Iron Curtain. The Council charges the State Department refused permission. This is denied.

The project for Bible-bearing balloons, they say, should be taken up with the West German authorities -- since the balloons were to be launched from German territory, to take Bibles into Czechoslovakia, Prize Poland, Russia.

The State Department expresses its attitude in these words: "Neither approval nor disapproval."

Explaining that our government favors Western Church projects to aid the churches behind the Iron Curtain.

Approval - would depend on whether or not the project seems likely to achieve that purpose. That's the attitude of the State Department.

NOTE

A late dispatch from Moscow says the Soviets are likely to reject an invitation to a four-power conference of the Foreign Ministers. Tonight, the United States, GreatBritain and France sent a message, suggesting a parley on German unification and an Austrian peace treaty. The Soviets declare that they want a much more inclusive kind of conference. So are not likely to accept the present invitation.

ADD PRISONERS

The citation shows that one night, nearly two years ago, Lieutenant Stone was in command of a detachment of the Eighth Cavalry, when the Chinese human sea came pouring over them. They drove the Reds back five times. But that could not go on forever.

"There were seven of us left to fight," the
Lieutenant relates. "I didn't ask them to fight. Each
man came to man me and told me he wanted to fight.

Not one man mentioned leaving or running out."

So he led them in one final hopeless attack.

All that survived were wounded and captured.

That won the Congressional Medal of Honor for Lieutenant Stone. But, when informed of this, the
