of the U.S.Attomey. Where, at a news conference, a spy thriller was related by Boris Morros, the Hollywood movie director and composer, Who turned out a successful film called, "Carnegie Hall" and composed "The Parade of the Wooden Soldier." Later - becoming a counter-espionage agent for the F.B.I., and bringing about the recent conviction of Jack and Myra Soble and Jacob Albam. Which unmasked a big-time conspiracy of Soviet espionage in this country.

Today, Boris Morros told newsmen that he was approached by Russian agents in ivineteen Forty-Five, who suggested - espionage. Morros listened, and informed the F.B.I. - who told him to go ahead, and enlist for counterespionage.

Thereafter, Morros played the part of a Soviet secret agent - passing on to them "secret documents", okayed by the F.B.I.

nineteen-day trip to Moscow - when he persuaded the chiefs of

Soviet Intelligence that he was a hot shot of Red espionage.

"This woman's report on me," he related, "was received in

Moscow - while I was there conferring with the heads of the Russian Secret Police."

So what happened? Morros did not go into details. He mereiy said, "I got out of that one all right."

He had a second narrow escape last July - when he was in Communist East Germany. The Reds nearly got on to him,

but horas warned in time.
He received a cable - containing one single word.

"Cinerama meant" $=$ "Come home at once, your life is in danger."
So he flew back to New York - where, three days later, the Soble-Albam espionage group was indicted. On the basis of testimony given by Maros.

Today he said that Coble passed him off in New York and in Europe - as an American millionaire. Which, apparently, helped Morris - playing the Soviet spy.

Over in Switzerland, hope is given up for three mountain climbers - trapped on a slope of Mount Eiger. The north wall of that mountain is considered - virtually suicide. $B 2 T$
four Alpinists, two Germans and two Italisn - tried to conquer it, One - rescued. Of the other three, one can be see dangling on a rope - head downward. Suspended, since last Wednesday, over a chasm two miles deep. Now -1 a lifeless s body. The two remaining climbers - last seen on a narrow icy ledge - but they have disappeared. They must have lost their grip - and plunged into the abyss.
$T$ the report was that rescue parties had been driven back by wild Alpine storms - after rescuing one of the
two climbers. He was hauled up from a ledge of rock, yesterday, by a German mountaineer - who was lowered by a steel cable, six hundred feet.

Mount Eiger had claimed a score of
victims in the past. Now - three more.

There was an uproar at Zurich, Switzerland, when several hundred youths returned - from the Youth Festival in Moscow. A train-load of three hundred and fifty arrived and, at the railroad station, were greeted by a crowd of students - who carried anti-Communist banners. One reading "Remember Hungary."

In no time at all, a fight was on. The Moscow group - manhandled. Some pushed back aboard the train - while others were chased out of the station.

There was a wild melee, with the swinging of sticks and pieces of luggage. One youth returning from Moscow flailing about with a balalaika, the Russian-style guitar.

An American student was pushed around, his luggage smashed. But he had nothing to do with the Moscow trip, just an innocent bystander.

TheDemocratic leader in the Senate, Lyndon Johnson
of Texas, predicts - that Congress will pass a Civil Rights bill with a jury trial amendment, next $\frac{\text { weand. }}{1}$. With the House accepting a modification of the jury trial amendment passed by the Senate.

Today, Speaker Sam Rayburn issued a new appeal to

Republicans in the House of Representatives - urging them to agree. The G.O.P. members, however, continue to talk of having a joint committee hammer out a Civil Rights measure more acceptable to President Eisenhower, Who is against - the jury trial amendment.
