MOSCOW

From Moscow comes a report telling of growing concern - on the Soviet-Chinese border. This according to Boris Ponomarev - Secretary of the Soviet Communist Party Central Committee; who says that "Chinese leadership - is conducting a relentless slander campaign" against the Soviet Union; and that "Peking's belligerent statements - are accompanied by territorial claims, by continued tension and vast military preparations!"

Egypt's President Sadat spent his second day in Paris today - mainly inspecting French ground-to-air missiles and electronic aircraft tracking devices; both of which - he hopes to buy for Egyptian troops. Sadat then meeting with French President Giscard D'Estaing - reportedly to discuss the possible purchase of a French nuclear reactor.

WHITE HOUSE

At the White House, ^{at} a prayer breakfast, ~~today,~~
~~including the singing of a hymn entitled - "The Fellowship~~
~~of Kindred Souls"~~ ^{with} President Ford later saying ^{that} "in a
secular way" - he strongly hopes "for some of that spirit
with the new Congress."

The President then ^{met} ~~meeting~~ with Congressional

differences over energy and economic policies. The two

ANKARA

The Turkish government at Ankara - today announced the start of its first troop pullback from Cyprus. The vanguard of a thousand-man brigade - heading home over the weekend; with the rest of the unit scheduled to withdraw within the next week or so.
