

GOOD EVENING EVERYBOLY:

From Moscow - word that General Ivan Serov has been
removed from his job as head of the Soviet secret police.

Why? We aren't told yet - only that Serov has been
"transferred" to another post.

It was Serow who replaced beria - in the job to
guarantee that there would be no serious opposition to
the communist regime in the Kremlin.

Serow's name was linked in the West with mass
executions and purges - and mass deportations of people
to Siberia. Now - he has been - transferred.

At Geneva, there's a turn for the better. The Soviets,
today, reversing their policy of obstruction inthe negotiations for a ban on atomic testing.
The Moscow delegation accepts ${ }^{\text {andentang }}$
to which they'll cooperate with the United States and Britain
in a control organization to police a test ban. A technical
group to be set up - with the Russians participating.

This follows an earlier weekend agreement - in which
the British and Americans joined the Russians in pledging - a ban on the testing of atomic weapons.)
interpretation - of the municipal election in West Berlin.
Previously, Red Premier Grotewohl had stated - that the balloting would be a test of public opinion.- concerning the Soviet proposal that West Berlin be made a "free city." The East German Reds believing - that the Communists would poll a large vote. Endorsing - the "free city" scheme.

Yesterday's election in West Berlin, however, was a Reds.
disaster - for the commonkastax In the balloting for local
officials, they got - less than two per cent of the vote.
So that's what changes the Communist interpretation.

Red Premier Grotewohl - reversing his previous declaration. Now stating - that the election was not in any way an expression of public opinion about that "free city" business.

In Washington, today, the State Department pointed out
the obvious - that the West Berliners voted overwhelmingly against
the scheme. Which might be a step - toward Communist control.

Senator Humphrey says he's brought two "secrets" back
from Soviet Russia. Which he'll give to President Eisenhower -
tomorrow. Recently, the Senator had an eight-hour interview
with Khrushchev in the Kremlin. The Soviet Premier disclosing to him those - "secrets/" One - concerning the problem of German unification. Khrushchev, sending the President, meacage through the Senator, a message on that point. The other item - information about Russian atomic and military progress.

The Minnesota legislator gave his opinion - that the Soviets don't want a war in the next seven years. Desiring peace - while their economic plans are being carried out.

## ROMANIA

Red Romania will stage - a wholesale trial of churchmen. That's the word in Bucharest, following the arrest of the patriarch of the Romanian Orthodox Church. Patriarch Marina Justinian - charged with anti-Communist activities.

Scores of other churchmen have been arrested - in preparation, apparently, for one of thoselCommunist show-case trials. For the purpose of crushing religion in Romania.

The government of Iraq announces - the crushing of a plot. A scheme - to overthrow Premier Kassem. The account of the Baghdad Radio is vague - with little intimation of who the plotters might be. Except - that they were backed by foreign elements. Which, according to some indications, might mean Americans.
U.N.

At the U.N., Israel today accused the United Arab Republic of - an "act of war." biagin Which refers back to the news we had last week - of syxa Syrian artillery bombarding Israeli villages nearthe border.

Today, the Israeli Ambassador told the sem Security

Council - that Israel will retaliate, unless the world organization does something effective in this matter of aggression.

Today, thdSupreme Court gave a ruling - important for
millions of people. Natural gas pipeline companies - allowed to
raise prices. On a "quickie" basis. That is, they may put an increase into effect, without waiting for approval from the

Federal Power Commission. Then, if the Commission decides a companies
hike is not warranted - the coanderay would give the customers a refund.

This "short cut method" was adopted by the Federal
Power Commission, and is now upheld by the Supreme Court.
The decision - expected to have large effects in the natural gas industry.

So that might be a new political future for Harry
Truman. Depending on - Symingtonfor president.
