Whereupon in a brief statement he said he was not involved in the Watergate bugging scandal or any other illegal act in the handling of more than forty-five million - in campaign funds. "As chairman of the committee - said he - "had no responsibility in connection with the internal handling of funds, banking, recording, accounting and reporting. I did not make entries in the books - or even see the books" he continued; "and I did not prepare the public reports - and did not review them except to scan their summary pages."
