The Russians are strengthening the guards around their military installations in Austria. Austrian sources say that at least fifteen Russian soldiers have tried to desert since the announcement that the Soviet occupation was to end. The Kremlin doesn't want anything like that - so the guards are bi being strengthened.

At the same time, the Iron Curtain countries on the Austrian border are clamping down on refugees. Czechs and Hungarians have been fleeing across the border. And now those two countries are reported to be laying new mine fields and setting up electric fences - to prevent any more from getting away.

In other words, there's quite a turmoil as the Russian prepare to leave Austria - because a lot of people wit would like to escape to freedom.

inside Estonia. That once-independent Baltic Republic, which has been in the grip of the Soviets ever since the war. A party of Finns has 'just returned from an inspection tour. And we get their impressions from R. Lindgren, who is Mayor of Kotka, Finland.
