Thurs. May 30-74.

For Henry Kissinger - en route home today from the Middle East - a triumphal stopover in Cairo; where he was cheered by Arab crowds - and then ^{he} conferred at length with Egypt's President Sadat.

There he ~~Dr. Kissinger~~ ^{ed} spelling out the final terms of the new truce agreement - between Israel and Syria. ^{Also -} He and Sadat ~~also~~ agreeing to establish "a joint commission" between the U.S. and Egypt; to provide for greater "cooperation - in various fields - for their mutual benefit."

WATERGATE

In the Watergate case - a series of fast-breaking developments.

First - a meeting of the House Judiciary Committee; approving by a vote of twenty-eight to ten - a new letter to the President, ~~The Committee~~ warning that continued refusal to turn over subpoenaed materials - could be considered grounds for impeachment. That done - the Committee subpoenaing forty-five additional White House tapes.

Meanwhile, the President's attorney, James St. Clair - filing a motion with the Supreme Court; attempting to prevent an attempted speed-up - in the Watergate litigation; urging that the case be decided - "wisely, not hurriedly." St. Clair ~~then adjourning to the courtroom of~~ ^{also filing a letter with} Judge Gesell - where ⁱⁿ he again invoked national security in the Ellsberg psychiatrist break-in. "The President is not desirous of having these indictments dismissed" - said he - "but he must implement the Constitutional

responsibilities of his office."

At the same time - a ruling by Judge Sirica; denying the House panel's request - for four White House tapes now in his possession. The Judge saying: "This situation - is a matter for Presidential, not judicial, review."

~~And now~~ The latest: A letter from Special Prosecutor ~~Leon~~ Jaworski - exonerating IT&T officials of any criminal violations ~~This~~ in connection with the Nineteen-Seveny-One - IT&T anti-trust settlement.

~~Along the way, incidentally - a report on a Presidential meeting with~~ ^{to} a number of conservative Congressman. ^{is} The President ^{today:-} quoted as saying ^λ "If I was guilty, I'd get the hell out fast - but I'm not guilty."

BELFAST

In Northern Ireland - a call today to reason and understanding. The Protestant Ulster Defense Association - urging talks between all political parties, both Protestant and Catholic. Saying: "Surely, in the name of God - we can come to an agreement that is both mature and Christian." Adding that the only alternative - "is a bloodbath, with no quarter given or expected."

Paris again - a meeting of leading non-Communist industrialized nations; approving today - a new "code of good behavior." This, in essence, a pledge to refrain from protectionist trade policies ^{Bill} that ^{might} ~~could~~ only lead to a global trade war.

MOSCOW

From Moscow sources - a report today that famed Soviet pianist Sviatoslav Richter - has asked permission to live abroad; also, Rudolf Barshai, chief conductor of the Moscow Chamber Orchestra - and Gennady Rozhdestvensky, former conductor of the Soviet Radio and Television Symphony.

This following by less than a week - the departure of famed cellist Mstislav Rostropovich. All of which is said to suggest - "a serious defection" in Soviet musical ranks.

LOS ANGELES

A team of thirteen Los Angeles policemen - is now in the home stretch of an amazing cross-country run.

Taking turns of ten miles each - the L.A. cops jogging all the way from Washington, D.C.; covering more than twenty-six hundred miles - in just twenty days. A jog - to end all jogs.
