The Soviet Reaction to President Eisenhower's declaration leaves Washington - rather startled. Diplomatic officials are not surprised that Moscow should be chilly toward the American suggestion - for an atomic agency to divert the atom from war to peece. But it is hard to figure how the Reds can read "war-mongering" into what the President had to say. Calling, as he did, on the United States and Soviet Russia to get together for an atomic version of beating swords into plowshares.

Nevertheless, the official Moscow radio, tonight, called the Eisenhower atomic peace plan -- "a threat to launch an atomic war." Called it "belligerent", a policy of serse force.

Kremlin reverts to its old contention - the atomic weapons must be abolished first. Stock piles of bombs destroyed -- before there can be any program for ending the danger of atomic war.

was hailing that Eisenhower declaration. In Britain,
hearty approval in quarters usually critical of American
foreign policy. The London evening News, teolering "Britain
fully backs proposals put forth by President Eisenhower in his historic speech on atomic future."

At the United Nations, pm opinion is that the Eisenhower program will be pressed in spite of the negative Russian response. It's worth trying, no matter. That was the view, today, as the General Assembly of the U N concluded its present session.

In Korea, the attitude of the pro-Communist prisoners of war has changed - but not for the better. Previously, the South Koreans refusing repatriation - had been quiet.

But, today, there was an warra unroar, with prisoners shouting and screaming, staging sit down strikes, trying to artack South Korean "explainers", one trial to hit an officer with a chair,

Thus far not one of the pro-Communists has changed his mind.

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overruled the Army, the Navy, and the Marine Corps - and ordered a ten per cent cut of manpower in the armed forces. This, in spite of protests from all three services. The Army - leading the chorus of complaint. The Army - to bear the brunt of the manpower cut. The Air Force would not actually make a reduction; - but would have to boost air power, increasing the number of its wings - without adding any more men.

All this would save a billion dollars a year in military pay, not counting other savings. The ten per cent reduction of manpower to be made in the space of a year, beginning July First, Nineteen Fifty-Four. The strength of the armed forces to be cut from three million, five hundred thousand to three million, two hundred thousand.

Wilson is said to have made the decision on Saturday last, after consulting with top officials, in Washington.

Over in West Germany, a final deadlock has been reached in the controversial case of Judge Williak Clark - who was ordered home, and refused to go. Judge Clark, head of the American judicial set-up in Western Germany, has long been at odds with our High Commissioner, former Harvard President Comant. The dispute has been in the news for weeks, and now - the climax.

Today, Clark was informed by the State Department that he has been suspended from his post as Chief Justice in Western Germany. Charged with - "insubordination." Whereupon High Commissioner Conant immediately named an official to take his place - Carl Fulghum, appointed Acting Chief Justice.

To which Judge Clark replies that he will "ignore" the suspension order. Declaring - that the appointment of a successor is "illegal." Defiance - all out.

So that completes the deadlock, and it remains to be seen what now will happen - in the battle between the U.S.

The White House gives its "last word" - in the battle of telegrams and letters with Senator McCarthy. Total some fifty thousand communications by wire and mail. In McCarthy's demand that we cut off American aid to countries trading with the Reds. The Senator asking people to support his policy by telegrams and letters to the White House.

Pifty thousand in all - and how are they divided?

President Secretary Jim Hagerty says that the telegrams show a majority in favor of the Administration - supporting the Eisenhower-Dulles foreign policy. The letters are the other way round - the majority backing the McCarthy demand that we stop helping countries trading with Communists.

General Electric announces a new security program. No mention of Senator McCarthy: but, the new program does follow the investigation of the McCarthy Sub-Committee into subversive activities in that great industrial organization. The penator quoted one witness as saying, "There are no secrets from the Communists of G.E."

R.J. Cordiner, Head of G.E. says, that in the future, they will discharge, immediately, all Communists, spies, or saboteurs and suspend employees who refuse to testify under oath - or who seek immunity under the Fifth Amendment. This to be retroactive and effective immediately - in a hundred and thirty plants.

Although the statement did not mention McCarthy, it did mention the testimony of some G.E. workers before Congressional Committees. Which obviously means, the McCarthy Investigating Sub-Committee primarily.

The Senator from Wisconsin calls the new G.E. program "a fine policy."

Senator Mc Carthy charges that the Army ignored an F.B.I. report, and kept an alleged Communist on the job - at the Radar Center, Fort Monmouth, New Jersey. Today, Aaron Coleman denied under oath that he ever was a Communist. Another witness testified that Coleman had once been a member of the Young Ecommunist League. Coleman denied this.

Whereupon Senator McCarthy stated that in

Nineteen Fifty-One, the F.B.I. gave the Army an unfavorable

report on the radar expert. But this was - "ignored", until

last autumn, when Coleman was suspended. McCarthy says this

Army business parallels the Harry Dexter White case, in which

the Assistant Secretary of the Treasury was promoted - after

espionage
the F.B.I. had sent evidence against him to the White House.

There was a dramatic disclosure at a trial of
Communists in Michigan today. The government produced a
"secret witness." And the revelation is - the secret witness
attended a Communist meeting only last night. A fifty-six year
old Negro, Berry Cody, who has been an under-cover man for the
F.B.I. for almost ten years. Cody says he joined the Communist
Party in Nineteen Forty-Four - at the suggestion of the F.B.I.
Today, he took the stand, and identified all six of the
defendants - as Communists.

In Paris, an American aviator, held on a charge of gold robbery, admits that he is the same as the pilot who was in the romantic headlines - back in the days of the Spanish Civil War. On Monday, we had the story of how Harold E. Dahl had been arrested - after twenty-eight thousand dollars in gold vanished from a Swiss airliner, which he had flown from Paris to Zurich. Now turns out to be "Whitey" Dahl - who, sixteen years ago, was saved from a Spanish firing squad by his beautiful blond wife.

whitey Dahl was a flyer for the Spanish Republicans in the war against Franco. He was shot down, and the news told-how he had been court-martialed, and condemned. Whereupon, his wife wrote a letter to Franco, pleading for her husband's life, and enclosing a photograph of herself. She was a singer, Edith Rogers Dahl - so good-looking that her picture, apparently, melted the heart of the Spanish Dictator. Anyway, Whitey Dahl was turned loose.

The aftermath - disillusioning. It was found that

the marriage of the flyer to the beauty who had saved his life, was illegal - one of those Mexican quickies. And, in time, Whitey Dahl married another girl.

Now, for another episode, he is in a Paris prison - charged with an aerial gold robbery.
