MOTT

The Soviet Union formally accused today of withholding evidence -- in the alleged prison-train suicide of American tourist Newcomb Mott.

An American note delivered to the Kremlin -- charging that Russia has refused to supply eyewitness reports from Young Mott's guards. Further, that Russia's investigation of the case -- left unanswered and unexplained a number of important questions. Chiefly -- why was Mott on his way to a labor camp in the first place -- when his appeal for clemency was still pending?

A U. S. Embassydenesman asserting -- "they just haven't proved how he died." Adding -- "we are neither accepting nor rejecting the suicide version -- we just don't have enough information."

Heated rebuttal today from Defense Secretary Robert

McNamara -- to weekend charges from the House Armed Services

Committee. One -- that he alone was largely responsible-
for delays in development of a new strategic bomber. And

two -- that he planned to cut the nation's manned bomber

force by one-third -- over the next five years.

The Committee guilty of painting a "shockingly distorted picture" -- said McNamara. Especially in its contention that "major decisions on the manned bomber program -- were made against the advice of the Joint Chiefs of Staff." The charge -- said he -- "without any foundation whatsoever."

As for a new strategic bomber -- McNamara stating there is "no clear need" for such a plane at present; but that future plans provide for construction of the craft in the Nineteen-Seventies -- "in the unlikely circumstances" that a need does develop.

Delegates present declaring "refusal to receive Negro members" in the church -- "to be a denial of the gospel of Christ." Also that withholding of funds by local church leadership for racial reasons -- is "an unjustified act" -- no longer to be tolerated.

The conference representing nearly a million Presbyterians -- in Sixteen Southern states.
