## CONVENTION FOLLOW SCRANTON

A Goldwater answer came quickly from San

Francisco, from his floor manager at the Convention 
Senator Carl Curtis of Nebraska. Who says flatly that

as of now - no Republican could beat President Lyndon

Johnson. And that what Goldwater meant was simply

this"- that any President is popular - for the first

six months in office. That President Johnson - has had

his six months, and now his popularity - is on the down

grate - that by November the time may be just ripe 
for Barry Goldwater.

Meanwhile, Scranton supporters - in a desperate last minute drive are thronging San Francisco hotel corridors. Also testifying before the Platform Committee Governor George Romney of Michigan, like Nelson Rockefeller, wants the GOP to - case off the support of extremist groups. And declare that the Civil Rights Law - is supported by the U.S. Constitution. But he

doesn't want any floor fight - about it.

Testigying along with Governor Romney ex-Ambassador Lodge who hammered away at what he
called Goldwater's "trigger-happy foreign policy"
Emphasizing as he has done before, that the President is responsible for the use of nuclear weapons.

But the Goldwater majority on the CARMERCAGOP

Platform Committee - showed no signs of being swayed.

## GOLDWATER-MILLER

Also, Goldwater supporters tell us who he wants for a running mate, when he wins the nomination - his first choice.

He wants Republican National Chairman William Miller.

Congressman Miller, from the Buffalo/Niagara

Falls district of New York State, is fifty-one, a Roman

Catholic - whose political views agree with those of the

man from Arizona. Their voting records - more or less

the same, except for the Civil Rights Bill - which

Miller supports.

The New York Congressman's other assets? He is well known - at all levels of the GOP. And the Goldwater forces regard him as a "bonnie fighter" who will wage a hard-hitting, efficient campaign.

Incidentally the six-term Congressman has announced that he will not seek a seventh term - in the House.

Luther Hodges calls - for a moratorium on demonstrations in the streets. Which is what Commerce Secretary Hodges - prefers to see. Instead of - demonstrations.
