The longest military airlift in history
is the one now operating between France and Indo-China.
American pilots, flying huge Douglas Globenasters,
each with around two hundred French soldiers -- rushing
them to the rescue of Dien Bien Phu.

The first troops went aboard the planes

yesterday -- parachute commandos. Taking off from Orly,

a military field just outside Paris. Tomorrow they are

due in Indo-China.

Other American planes also are picking up French forces at bases in North Africa.

This American airlift was hurriedly set up afters as a result of urgent appeals from General Navarre,

French Commander in Indo-China. His call for paratrooper -- needed right away if Dien Bien 22 is to be held.

The immediate American response indicates how anxious our government is to help France save her position in Indo-China.

The French Secretary of War said today that France will throw in all of her forces, if necessary -

to prevent the Reds from taking Dien Bien Phu on the eve of the Geneva Conference.

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WILSON - FOLLOW AIRLIFT

However, this American airlift halfway round the world, between France and Indo-China -- is not a step toward involving us in the fighting there. So says Secretary of Defense Wilson. He told newsmen today that the airlift is in line with our general policy -- to help France all w can. But when asked if this moves us closer to the fighting -- he replied bluntly - "No!"

membership. But Dr. Evans added that he would not go
out of his way to appeal to the Kremlin to come in.

At last -- Molotov sent a letter to Evans, requesting membership. Which is granted automaticall y to nations in the U.N.

when the Russian delegation turned up today -it behaved in typical Soviet fashion. The head of the
delegation, demanding that Red China and EastGermany
be invited to participate.

In Moscow, Malenkov gets an okay from the Parliament -- the Supreme Soviet. In accordance with Kremlin custom, he and the other Ministers resigned, formally.
