A rare public statement today from Independence,

Missouri. Eighty-two-year-old former President Truman
calling on the American people to give President Johnson

"their full support" - in his handling of the Vietnam situation

Said Harry Truman: "Southeast Asia has become a critical testing ground - of our will to support the cause of freedom - as well as the cause of peace. We cannot afford now to falter - or to throw away the gains so dearly won."

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An air of official optimism - today at Guam.

President Johnson winding up Vietnamese policy talks - with all concerned

reporting increasing military progress against Communist

forces. All equally agreed - on the need to intensify political
and economic followup to military progress.

Nevertheless, an obvious split - behind the closed doors. With Premier Ky of South Vietnam apparently pursuing in private - his pressure earlier in public for heavier blows against the Viet Cong. Ky asking such questions as: Why the United States doesn't extend the war to Cambodia and Laos? How much longer will Hanoi - "enjoy the privilege of restricted bombing?" And what about the main Communist supply port of Haiphong - why shouldn't it be sealed?

The President reportedly turning aside Ky's queries to turn the conference to talk of peace. On that score,
however, Secretary of State Dean Rusk later admitting there has been no progress on getting Hanoi to the peace table.

President Johnson's visit to Guam - apparently the signal for stepped-up Viet Cong attacks throughout Vietnam. Resulting, ironically - in some of the heaviest Cong losses in weeks.

The biggest and costliest battle today - for the Viet

Cong - about thirty miles north of Saigon. A full regiment

of enemy troops - some twenty-five hundred, in all - jumping

a hundred U.S. infantyymen on a road clearing operation.

Caught in the open - the American's circling their armored vehicles just like a wagon train - under Indian attack in the Old West. Cutting down charge after charge - until the Viet Cong finally gave it up.

The enemy leaving behind - two hundred and twenty-

Battlefield setbacks over the weekend - adding at least three hundred and forty-four more to the enemy toll.

Most of these - in ill-fated Viet Cong thrusts near the Cambodian border.

Great Britain was on the receiving end of a strong protest today -from Red China; for allowing United States war ships to enter the British crown colony of Hong Kong.

The British charge - d'affaires in Peking was presented a formal note - from the Chinese government;
charging that "some seventy to eighty war ships - directly
concerned with the Vietnam War - have berthed at Hong Kong!
just since the beginning of this year. This called proof
that the United States is using Hong Kong - "as a base of
aggression against Vietnam."

This - said Peking is "a provocation against the

Vietnamese people, Communist China and the people of

Southeast Asia." Adding that unless it is stopped - Britain

must bear responsibility "for the serious consequences that

may arise."

The State Department disclosing today -- that the Vice President will be off to Europe next week -- to Bonn -- for a conference of U.S. chiefs of missions in western Europe; also stops at other European capitals.

From Bonn we hear that Humphrey's trip to Europe will be in lieu of a promised visit from President Johnson, plans for which -- now appear to have been shelved. U.S. officials maintaining, however, that no decision has been made as yet -- on the LBJ trip.
