HOUSE

The House Judiciary Committee today resumed its impeachment inquiry - behind closed doors. In morning and afternoon sessions - listening to tapes of President Nixon's Watergate conversations.

The committee to meet again tomorrow morning to consider the possibility of issuing another subpoena
for additional White House material. But the President's
counsel - James St. Clair - saying if the committee
"utilized all of the evidence available to it - no evidentiary
gap would exist."

STUDY FOLLOW HOUSE

Another House panel today completed a year-long study - dealing with public spending on the President's private residences. The Government Operations Committee - urging that Congress set a limit on such expenditures.

But it stopped short - of actually criticizing the President.

Instead, blaming excessive spending - on the General Services Administration and the Secret Service.

REACTION FOLLOW STUDY

Meanwhile, the Watergate backlash - continues to mount; with leading Democrats - again in the forefront.

Democratic National Chairman Robert Strauss
deploring what he called "this terrible hue and cry for the

resignation of the President." House Speaker Carl Albert

saying: "It would be disastrous for the President to resign."

Senator Ervin noting that he didn't "vote to put the

President into office" - and so had no right now "tell him

to quit."

Senator Minority Leader Hugh'Scott - was also having some second - or is it third - thoughts today. At any rate, he said that Democratic leaders were "right - to allow the system to function." Adding: "I think I'll stay with that position - myself."

In the same vein perhaps - the Pottstown Mercury at Pottstown, Pennsylvania, today offered its readers - a "Watergate-less" newspaper. This by means of a two-page pull-out section - containing all the latest on the Watergate case; with readers advised to "use it - or throw it away."

By the way, One reader later calling, and saying:

"Thank God - it's the first time I haven't seen Watergate
on page one somewhere."

The White House - President Nixon today signed a bill - encouraging states to treat alcoholics as sick people rather than criminals; also, recombining the Federal apparatus for research and development - in both drug abuse and alcoholism.

The President saying: "In dealing with drug abuse and alcoholism - party lines are crossed; and now we have the tools - to deal with these problems."

The White House again - President Nixon today

named Air Force General George Brown - the new chairman

of the Joint Chiefs of Staff. General Brown succeeding

Admiral Thomas Moorer - who retires July Second.
