*From Cyprus.....*

*From San Clemente.....*

*From Washington, comes today's news. Good Evening,  
this is Mike Wallace for Lowell Thomas.*

*There is a Cease-fire in Cyprus - tonight ...  
according to the United Nations Command on the island.  
The truce was scheduled for Ten this morning, Eastern-  
time, but it failed to bring an immediate end to the  
fighting. Indeed, the appointed hour came and passed - with  
bitter battles still raging in Nicosia.*

*But Turkey and Greece have both reaffirmed their  
support of the U. S. -sponsored peace move. Ordering their  
troops - to cease their firing. Secretary of State Henry  
Kissinger says he is now confident - the cease-fire "will  
stick."*

*Greece and Turkey have agreed to attend a peace*

**parley - starting Wednesday in Geneva; with Britain -  
serving as neutral referee.**

**And the U.N. Command in Cyprus says there is a  
ceasefire in effect there tonight.**

## **EHRlichman**

**In Washington, Judge Gerhard Gesell today dismissed one of the three counts - on which John Ehrlichman was recently convicted of perjury. The Judge said the statute in question, which prohibits lying to the FBI - "was not properly invoked in this case." He rejected, however - Ehrlichman's appeals on the two other ~~counts~~ counts. The President's former domestic affairs adviser - still faces up to ~~20~~ twenty years in prison and Thirty Thousand dollars in fines.**

**A three-day vigil of prayer and fasting in behalf of the President - began today on the steps of the Capitol. The demonstration led by Rabbi Baruch Korff - who heads the National Citizens Committee for Fairness to the Presidency. Rabbi Korff called ~~the~~ the House Judiciary Committee - a "lynch mob;" and its chief counsel, John Doar - a "paid assassin." Adding ~~the~~ prayers are especially needed - "now that the final crisis is at hand."**

## **PORTLAND**

*Former Senator Wayne Morse of Oregon - died today at Portland, at the age of seventy-three. Victim of a kidney ailment.*

*Wayne Morse, when he was Senator - was one of the first to condemn U.S. involvement in Vietnam.*



**MADRID**

**Generalissimo Franco of Spain - was reported in grave condition last week in Madrid; but today he is apparently much improved. Doctors say the Spanish ruler - is progressing "favorably."**

## GETTYSBURG

*From Mamie Eisenhower - a moving tribute to the late President Eisenhower, in an interview - marking the fifth anniversary of his death.*

*Says Mrs. Eisenhower: "It used to anger me when people would say, 'You're an Army wife, you must be used to Ike being away.'" "I never got used to him being gone" she continued; "he was my husband - my whole life."*

*Mrs. Eisenhower also said her favorite monument - is the statue of Ike on the grounds of Gettysburg College. "always speak to him - when I pass it" - she said. And "during the winter" - she added - "I don't like to see the snow covering his head."*

## **SAN CLEMENTE**

**At San Clemente today - President Nixon conferred with his chief defense lawyer, James St. Clair, who is expected to meet shortly with newsmen. His purpose expressed by White House News Secretary Ron Ziegler; "to move people to look at the facts - and not simply conjecture and surmise which has built up over the last two years."**



## WASHINGTON

*In Washington - the full House voted today to allow live broadcast coverage - of the House Judiciary Committee final deliberations. And then the committee itself voted to permit live broadcast coverage of the impeachment debate and the balloting that follows.*

*Meanwhile, the committee heard another final summation today. This one from Sam Garrison, the committee's newly-installed chief Republican counsel. Garrison said the question is not "what the President did on a particular date - or whether there was complicity in a crime; but whether the public interest will be served or diserved - by removal of the President from office."*

## **INFLATION**

**The President will deliver an address on the fight against inflation Thursday night to an audience of businessmen in Los Angeles, and his top advisers will answer questions afterward. Mr. Nixon's economic strategists said the President will not be making any major policy changes, despite indications that the nation was in at least a mild recession during the first half of the year, with prospects of substantial new price increases on a broad front for the rest of the year.**

**Meanwhile, White House officials said Mr. Nixon soon would announce his choice of New York Economist Alan Greenspan to succeed Herbert Stein as Chairman of the Council of Economic Advisers.**

## **LAGUNA BEACH**

**And today - a prediction of better things to come, came from Chairman Herbert Stein - of the President's Council of Economic Advisers; based on a visit he made to a Chinese restaurant - in Laguna Beach, California. Stein says he was given a fortune cookie that assured him:**

**"Money matters will improve - after awhile."**

**Which is as good as any news we've heard lately from any economist - and perhaps as valid.**
