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today tended to view the appointment of General
Marshall as $\boldsymbol{A}$ result of the November elections, President Truman acting in conformity with that swing to the right.

chandon today. The Left Wing Laborites have bean attacking British Foreign Secretary Bevin for joining our own Regex Secretary Byrnes in the policy of get-tough with the Soviets, and today they were saying that Marshall is not likely to be any less tough - he being an Army man, a Geez General. British Left Wing Laborites have been criticizing General Marshall's policy in China, and they weren't any too happy today.

There's much London speculation about the way Soviet Russia will take the Marshall appointment. matter of keenest interest to the British, Who are highly sensitive of their position in the middle - between the United States and the Soviets. The comment from Moscow? Nothing.
