will power, but he has to deal with a really stubborn eitizen. Lar Daly, a Chicago business man, Taday, the General withdrew from the Illinois Republican

Primary. But that doesn't count not with Lar Daly.

Is not a number one MacArthur booster, who put the General's name in the primary - without the General's consent. MacArthur declared himself out - but that didn't count, not with Lar Daly.

On Tuesday, the General sent a telegram to Illinois primary officials, demanding that his name be taken off the ballot. The officials replied that - they'd have to have a written statement, attested by a notary. The General went ahead and sent a written statement, with his own signature and a notary's official seal. Today the primary people obliged - and removed the General's name.

But that doesn't count with Lar Daly either.

He declares that he's taking the case to the Illinois

Supreme Court. He finds a legal technicality
which, he claims, will keep MacArthur in the primary,

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no matter what the General says.

His plan is to produce a "draft" which MacArthur will be unable to ignore. Well, it's hard to ignore Lar Daly - one stubborn citizen.

Governor Dewey comes out with a full dress program for American policy in the Far East. He demands a treaty to defend the entire Pacific - and southeast Asia. The United States -- to join with every other country that will sign such a treaty.

The titular head of the Republican Party presented this proposal in an address before the National Industrial Conference Board in New York only a few minutes ago. He pointed out that we have already guaranteed to defend Japan, the Philippines, Australia, and New Zealand, so that should simply be extended to what he calls - "the great areas in between." Southeast Asia, like Malaya and Indo-China - now threatened by the Reds.

The international treaty that he suggests would warn that - if Soviet Russia or Communist China should invade, we would meet the challenge "by every weapon at our command."

Governor Dewey speaks in the light of the forty thousand mile tour of the Pacific he made last summer - what

he saw and learned at first hand.

The word still persists that, in Korea, the allies are getting ready for new concessions in the truce talks. One sign being -- a new negotiator.

"fireball" Ferenbaugh. Because of his outspoken way with

Red negotiators. The belief is that General Harrison

will use a more tactful diplomatic approach - not so

Another sign - a repetition today of yesterday's offer of a compromise on the subject of Red airfields. Today, for a second time, the U N Truce team indicated that they would be satisfied with a simple promise that the Communists, during an armistice, would not build up air power on flying fields in Red Korea. But, once again, they got no answer from the Reds.

Deadlock as tight as ever, as the dispatches

Japan is resuming diplomatic relations with the Vatican - so announced in Rome tonight. Relations ended seven years ago, upon the surrender of Japan - when the conquered country ceased to be a sovereign power. But now the peace treaty restores to Japan the full privileges of diplomacy - and relations with the Vatican are immediately restored.

meeting of Huk leaders, conferring in their mountain hideout. The plan is to surround the Communist headquarters, before the leaders can get away -- thereby seizing the high command of the Hukk in one fell swoop.

That was the hope, as the drive today made swift progress -- spearheaded by Philippine combat veterans from Korea.

From the Himalayan land of Nepal, strange news of revolt - an insurrection that swept the capital city of Khatmandu, But - was quickly surpressed.

Recently, Nepal overthrew the power of the great Rana Family, which had been in control for more that than a century. A liberal government was installed - and you might suppose the trouble was the doing of the ousted clan of Rana. But not at all. The revolt was instigated by a Dr. Singh, who figured in the downfall of the Ranas.

The turned against the new government today led a revolt of the Raksha Dal, a sort of Nepalese Militia.

This Dr. Singh was in jail. The prison guardsa detachment of the Raksha Dal. That outfit of Militia
was used to guard all the government buildings. So the
prisoner converted his jailers - and they, in turn,
talked other units of the Raksha Dal into joining an
insurrection.

Today, suddenly, the jailers freed their prisoner, and marched under his leadership. At the same time, other detachments of the Raksha Dal, guarding

public buildings, captured headquarters of the Ministry, the arsenal, the radio station, and the airport at Khatmandu.

So it looked like a clean sweep; but, the Raksha Dal Militia forgot about the regular army. Government soldiers rallied against the revolt - which immediately collapsed, after so much initial success.

So we hear from Khatmandu, which states that the rebel chieftain is a fugitive - the prisoner who talked his jailers into a conspiracy to overthrow the government.

TUNISIA

Today, flashing scenes were witnessed at the Cap Bon Peninsula, the tip of Tunisia that reaches north into the Mediterranean -- and it may be that a French garrison there was relieved without firing a shot.

Riot and disorder have been spreading in that North African land -- native mobs in revolt against the French. The news today tells of clashes in half a dozen places, but the focus of interest is Cap Bon.

There, a French detachment occupying a military post, was assailed by swarms of white robed insurgents, who attacked with -- dynamite. The garrison radioed a frantic message -- send tanks, planes!

Well, the planes got there first, and they
were jets -- vampire jets of British model. They came
roaring through the sky, and down they streaked with a
whistling roar of jet. Making passes at the Moslem swarm
besieging the garrison post. The latest news describes
the white robed assailants fleeing in panic. Although,

Poison is the word - the deadliest. The warning is that anybody opening one of those barrels - might be killed by the fumes of ayantee.
