Thurs, aug. 13-10,

The House voted today to over-ride President Nixon's veto of the four-and-a-half billion dollars it sustained his school aide bill. But, in another vote, xtx x it x saus and ain veto of the eighteen billion dollar measure for housing, space, veterans and other programs. President Nixon will send Vice President Agnew to South Vietnam and three other Asian countries on a fact finding trip later this month. While House Press Secretary Ron Zeigler says that - during the trip from August twenty-second to thirtieth - Agnew will visit to South Korea, Taiwan, and Thailand as well as South Vietnam. Zeigler says the President wants Agnew to obtain first hand impressions on the effect of the Nixon doctrine which was outlined at Guam abotxabot about a year ago. This xtartix In this doctrine the President urged non-Communist nations of Asia to shoulder a greater burden of their own self-defense and thereby setting a precedent for gradual US withdrawal from thexAxsian xmaxnkandxx Southeast Asia.

SUMMIT

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Eastern European diplomatic reports say Soviet Premier Kosygin definitely plans to meet with President Nixon and other western leaders in New York this October - at the U N's twenty-fifth anniversary session. Kosygin is said to prefer a four power meeting with the President and the French and British Premiers. However, should that be impractical, a meeting between Kosygin and the President would appear "inevitable,"

INDO CHINA

In Paris, the Hanoi delegates at the peace talks say their chief negotiator - Xuan Thuy - soon will rejoin the talks after an eight monthy boycott. At the sum time Thuy said he was quitting the talks because President Nixon had failed to replace Henry Cabot Lodge when he resigned as chief American negotiator last November. Two weeks ago, the President named top ranking diplomat David K. Bruce to lead the American deduced delegation in Paris. MID EAST

A military spokesman in Amman says Israeli jets strafed a village in northern Jordan today with rockets and machine gun fire, In violation of the Middle East cease fire. Israel mean accuses Egypt of deploying new Soviet anti-aircraft missiles **cinco** in the Suez Canal zone - also in clear violation of the cease fire agreement. MID EAST

Under the terms of American proposals for the cease fire both sides agreed not to move any new military equipment into the Canal Zone during the three months halt in the shooting. At a hearing in Washington today an army spokesman - under questioning by a federal judge -today admitted that the concrete containers containing deaths nerve gas rockets might burst under pressure if sent sixteen thousand feet down into the ocean aboard a sinking ship. The federal judge - June L Green then said she wanted to hear expert scientific testimony before making a decision of Florida Governor Kirk's request for a temporary xxxxx restraining order on the army's plan to dump/the rockets into the Atlantic east of Cape Kennedy. Kirk and others claim dumping the gas in more shallow water would mean less pressure and less likelihood of the concrete containers rupturing.

General Motors and one of its most persistent critics - consumer advocate Ralph Nader issued a joint statement today - announcing an out of court settlement of Nader's twenty-six million dollar invasion of privacy suit against G M. The settlement was for four-hundredand-twenty-five thousand dollars. Nader had charged that private detectives were hired to harass him and question acquaintances about his private life. JEWELS

A gang of acrobatic jewel thieves who swung on ropes from building to building to escape the police was finally grounded in New York. Police cornered the culprits by using an electronic device developed for night fighting in Vietnam. One man was captured and four others escaped 4 leaving, behind two-hundred-forty_ thousand dollars worth of gold and diamond rings which had been hurled into a courtyard. When same gang is believed responsible for about forty jewel burglaries in New York. Their technique involved hiding in a building in until closing time, then breaking into the vaults. This usually set off the burglar akank alarm and instead of returning below on the elevator, they used the ropes to swing to adjacent buildings and escape while the police were rushing in the front door.
