## MCGOVERN

Senator McGovern of South Dakota today, as predicted, became the first announced candidate - for the Democratic Presidential nomination for Nineteen Seventy Two. The Senator pledging, if elected, a complete withdrawal from South East Asia coupled with a second American Revolution to speed domestic reform.
For Senator Dole of Kansas - another broadcast
appearance today; where the new Republican National

Chairman - expanded on remarks he first made over the weekend. Dole saying he expected that Spiro Agnew would continue to serve as major spokesman for administration policy. "He did an excellent job last year" - said, bole - and "he'll do an even better job this year." The senator adding that is "the ideal candidate to run again with President

Nixon in Nineteen Seventy-two."

## PITTSBURGH

On the steel front - Bethlehem Steel acceded to the President's request, announcing a substantial reductionin the price increase it had put forward last week. This also matched by a lesser price schedule announced last Saturday by U.S. Steel.

Today's action thus following a script originally charted by John F. Kennedy - and later used by Lyndon Johnson. President Nixon becoming the third straight President - to get a roll back on a planned steel price hike.

## WHITE HOUSE

The White House again. A high level meeting today
to chart the future course of U.S. war policy. This coming amid-reports of stepped up U.S. support - to Cambodian and South Vietnamese troops now fighting in Cambodia.

The White House however, saying there has been no change with respect to U.S. involvement in Cambodia. Adding there are no plans whatsoever - to use any U.S. troops there.

Planes - yes; foot soldiers - no.

UNITED NATIONS

At the United Nations - Secretary General U Thant today in his first press conference of the new year - says he has "no intention whatsoever" of serving beyond his present term - which expires at the end of the year.

He also expressed cautious optimism over the outlook
for mideast peace talks. Cairo also saying the prospects
for an extension of the current mideast ceasefire - are
somewhat brighter.

New York City: Morgan Guaranty Trust today reduced its prime interest rate another quarter of a point - down to six percent; and other banks followed suit. This the sixth major rate cut - since November; the second in the last two business days. The President remarked: "This easing of credit will also be reflected in the mortgage market;" tic thereby providing further strength - for the home building industry."

FED

A few hours later - the Federal Reserve Board
announced another interest cut of its own. Dropping its
so-called "discount rate" - the amount it charges on loans
to member banks - from five-and-a-quarter percent down to a flat five. And so the trend to easier money continues.

MOSCOW

While the U.S. and the Soviet Union are still at odds
on most things here on earth, where space is concerned maybe it's another story. U.S. space chief Dr. George

Low - was conferring in Moscow today with his Soviet
counterpart - one Mastislav Keldysh, President of the Soviet

Academy of Science. The George Low visit following earlier contacts dealing withthe possible standardization of U.S.
and Soviet Space procedures; especially those relating to
medical techniques and docking collars - a first step in
paving the way for joint space rescue efforts - if and when.

MOON FOLLOW MOSCOW

Moscow again - a report that Russia's moon-
walker-one - today completed a journey of about half a kilometer; and then returned to its mother ship in the sea of rains - there to complete another of its, "quote, "planned experiments." Moscow calling this - an historic feat, marking, for the first time, the return of a self-propelled apparatus to a presplanned point at a preplanned time -on the surface of a different celestial body."

Here at home - at Cape Kennedy where they're getting ready to shoot for bigger game - a slight delay today for the critical mock count-down for the moon-bound Apollo Fourteen. The mock blast-off this evening Then the real thing a week from Sunday.

SAN DIEGO

From the American Tuna Boat Association of San Diego, a report today that four more American tuna boats have just been seized off the coast of Ecuador. Raising to eight, the number of such boats seized over the past week.

This coming almost simultaneous with a State Department protest demanding an end to the "shooting harrassment and seizure of U.S. tuna boats."

Incidentally, the flagship of the Chilean fleet that
seized the tuna boats - is ironically - a former U.S.
destroyer - and the Chilean aircraft flying cover overhead
also former U.S. warplanes.
