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That plane crash over Ankara - sent debris crashing down all over the city. The fuselage of the Turkish Air Force plane -slamming into historic Ankara Citadel. One wing of the civilian airliner - dropping into the main square.

Other pieces of debris - landing in side streets and back alleys.

Four big buildings - went up like target torches.

A dozen cars - burned out at the curb. Others, hit wi while moving - in the middle of the street. Manner damage ispetted; across the entire city, himsets.

The toll - evidently greater than in any previous

air disaster. Some sixty killed, - about the same number

injured.

How the airliner and the military plane happened to reach the same point in the sky at the same moment - not yet determined.

The dispute between Ottawa and Washington - has simmered down. And I do mean washington - No heated remarks today, like those of yesterday - when Prime Minister Diefenbaker accused us of interfering in Canada's internal affairs. But - neither side has withdrawn from its previous position.

Diefenbaker, repeating - that his original statement

was "correct and proper." Adding - "we need no assistance

from the State Department." Will there be a Canadian

election soon - because of this furery The Canadian Prime

Minister is remaining mum about that.

On the American side of the international fence,

Secretary of Rusk insists - that there was no undiplomatic

interference ins by Washington. That our government simply

found it necessary to reveal our position - concerning

nuclear arms for Canada. That we have a perfect right
to keep the record straight.

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ALLIANCE

There is no radical split in the western alliance according to the American Secretary of State. Dean Rusk,
admitting that DeGaulle's ** veto of British membership in
the common market - has a created new problems. But denying
that there is any break - in the anti-Communist front. The
nations of the West, still bound together, in Rusk's words "by the harsh realities of the cold war." Namely - the
threat of Red aggression.

The immediate effect - of the DeGaulle veto? Bean
Rusk sees - "a period of pause, a reconsideration of
alternatives."

MACMILLAN

The visit of the British Prime Minister to Rome
was supposed to be - routine. Nothing special on the agenda,
when MacMillan arranged to hold talks with Premier Fanfani.

Well, the visit has turned out to be - anything but routine. MacMillan bringing with him - Lord Privy Seal Edward Heath, Britain's negotiator of at the abortive Brussels talks. Italy backed Britain - for membership in the Common Market. And MacMillan hopes to work out something more tangible - before he leaves Rome.

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ATOMIC

The American moratorium on underground atomic explosions - lasted less than a week. On Saturday, President Kennedy announced the suspension of the Nevada tests - as a conciliatory gesture during the negotiations for a test ban.

Then the Soviets has became recalcitrant - in their usual fashion. And today Dean Rusk told his news conference - that our underground nuclear series will be resumed.

Khrushchev, not getting anywhere thinks he can maneuver us into a unilateral test ban.

The Red Cross announces that Fidel Castro has received - half of his random for the invasion prisoners.

Almost thirty million dollars worth of medical supplies - already transported to Havana. The rest, to be delivered in the next few weeks.

At the same time, American citizens are continuing to arrive - in Miami. Flown by Red Cross planes - from the Red-dominated island.

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Rusk said today that we will take any necessary steps - if
the Russians try to make their stay permanent. Khrushchev
promised to pull his military forces at out of Cuba - "in
due course." But, said Dean Rusk today "due course isn't
fast, in this case."

EUROPE

A Londoner said today "that talk about an ice age a hundred thousand years from now, why, it's already here".

All fifty-three counties of England and Wales, covered by ice and snow. The cold indoors, worse than ever - because of the shortage of kerosene, the traditional British substitute for central heating.

France and Italy have more snow tonight than they've had in seven years. East dermans have been ordered to use melted snow for everything except drinking - because of water shortage.

Here's a dispatch from the Gulf of Bothnia.

A Swedish conscript phoned regimental headq warters at one in the morning, identifying himself as a security officer, ordering the regiment there on the S oviet frontier to fall out - repel an invasion.

Picture the scene - in the darkness there near the Arctic Circle. Bugles blaring the call to arms. Infantry, racing out of barracks - into the Arctic cold. Tanks roaring over frozen tundra - toward the border. Pilots and radar men, searching the skies - for war planes.
