French President DeGaulle and British Prime

Minister Harold Wilson met in Paris today - for talks

aimed at breaking the ice in Anglo-French relations.

It was the first such meeting between French and British

chiefs of state - since Nineteen Sixty-Three- when DeGaulle

vetoed English membership in the Common Market.

The talks- preliminary in nature - but DeGaulle later voicing his pleasure at the direct contact. Because - as he put it - every time Britain and France fall out - it causes "great inconvenience". And every time they become friends again - it brings "great advantages."

Wilson's comment - perhaps more to the point.

If Britain and France are to achieve their joint destiny said Wilson - "they must cooperate with each other - and
with their neighbors."

Also in Germany - Communist border guards

today harassed Berlin-bound traffic - for the first time in

six months. Traffic piled up on the Autobahn for miles 
with East German police staging slow and painstaking

inspections - of all trucks carrying supplies to the isolated

city.

The slowdown lasting seven hours in all.

Apparently in reprisal for West Germany's plan - to

convene its parliament in West Berlin next week - despite

Communist objections. However, West Berlin Mayor

Willy Brandt declaring that the Communist "chicanery" 
his word - will not block the city's efforts to tighten

its ties with the West.

From Beirut today - reports of a secret Arab commando organization - waging a war of sabotage against the State of Israel. The organization called "Al-Asifa" - Arabic for storm troops. Al-Asifa said to have staged at least nine raids deep into Israeli territory - since the first of the year. Said to have blown up an Israeli ammunition dump - killing or wounding at least twenty Israeli soldiers - in its latest raid last month.

The Arab commando outfit - supposedly based in Beirut; But made up of small bands of Palestinian refugees - living just across the border from Israel - in Lebanon, Syria, Jordan and Gaza.

Their raids - up to now - little more than a "nuisance" to the Israelis. As for the Arab nations neighboring Israel - they have so far disavowed any connection with Al-Asifa. Indeed, some are believed to have tried to curtail its activities - lest the secret Al-Asifa - set off another full-scale war in the Middle East.

Major General John K. Hester - reported

Tsepon financial Shakabpa was chief advisor to the Dalai Lama's government, both at Lhasa and in exile, on financial affairs. He led the first Tibetan mission that ever came to America. He also headed the Tibetan group that attempted to negotiate with the Chinese at the time of the Red invasion.

Tsepon Shakabpa has just completed a year's residence at Yale University where there is an important collection of Tibetan books and records. The Tsepon -- that is his title -- has had the cooperation of Yale; and the Yale University Press announces that it will publish his book.

the book has been written at the special request of a young man the Dalai Lama, who down through these tragic years has grown in stature as a wise and able leader of his people.
