#### PHILIPPINES

#### SEGREGATION

## FISENHOWER ATOMIC

Today brought a Presidential reply to the Stevenson proposal - that atomic tests be discharge discontinued. Mr. Eisenhower telling his news conference -that it would be "foolish" to stop testing H-bombs, until we got an agreement that Russia and the other nations would follow suit,

## ADD EISENHOWER

Late this evening, Mr. Eisenhower issued a formal statement from the White House - repeating what he said in his news conference - and charging that Stevenson is spreading confusion, with his proposal to stop hydrogen bomb tests.

#### EISENHOWER TWO TERMS

President Eisenhower expressed a surprising opinion today. Saying - he's doubtful of the wisdom of the "two term" constitutional amendment. Which was launched by a Republican congress - and ratified by the States. Limiting the Presidency to two terms.

The President indicated - a mild sort of disagreement.

Saying: "By and large - the United States ought to be able to choose for its President - anybody it wants. Regardless - of the number of terms he has served."

The subject came up at a news conference, today, when reporters made the suggestion that's heard from time to time. That President Eisenhower's leadership would be weakened in a second term, because everybody would know that it would be in his last. The President admitted - that his influence might be lessened by the two term limitation. But added - that the power that goes with the Presidency is so great, that a President would still have a dominating position.

Then it was that spoke up with a mild opinion - that the two term limitation might not be so wise.

world series record.

And what a wild and wooly fantasy was that second inning! Eleven runs in the 2nd; which ties the record for World Series play. Equalling an eleven run single inning - staged - twenty-seven years ago - by the Philadelphia Athletics and the Chicago cubs.

The Yankees had scored a run in the first inning, then they made five more in the second. Yogi Berra - lining out a grand slam home run. But, in the second half of the second, the Dodgers tied it up with a six run rally. Featured - by Duke Snider's three run homer.

After that, the Dodgers went on to score - inning after inning. First Baseman Gil Hodges - a batting hero. In 1952 he was the goat of the World Series; with - not a hit. Today, he slammed out two doubles, each good for two runs. Which wrapped up the game.

Some thirty thousand spectators witnessed the pitching nightmare - including Presidential candidate Adlai Stevenson. Who beheld - not a political, but a baseball landslide.

Adlai Stevenson is in New England tonight - after attending the World Series game, today. Leaving the ball park he flew up to New Haven, for an address at Yale. There he criticized the Republican party - for krym trying to foster a spirit of complacency among the voters.

"We have heard a great deal and we're going to hear a lot more in the weeks ahead about prosperity and peace", declared the candidate. And added: "But, surely, the uneven measure of prosperity we now enjoy and the restless and uneasy peace in which we now find ourselves - were not achieved by standing still and admiring them."
