With Congress in recess though - Acting Chairman Stuart Symington was the only Senator present, putting Colby through two hours of questioning on how he would deal with another Watergatetype situation.

Gromyko also saying he hopes that "the Western countries will submit proposals & that will truly lead to peace and security in Europe." Adding emphatically: "The Soviet delegation - will do its best."

Now a threat that New Zealand may also protest - the continuation of U.S. underground nuclear testing here in the States. Kirk then adding that the Soviet Union - may become still another target. "At a time" - said he - "when attitudes between Communist and non-Communist nations are probably the best since World War Two - it is simply not possible to understand or justify arms expansion."
