ENERGY

From the Federal Energy Office we have a report that Americans have shown - quote - a "tremendous response" - in reducing their use of home heating oil. Spokesman Charles Owens saying "consumers have literally cut back their thermostats - by fifteen per cent."

He also says prices of home heating oil - have "about topped out;" with new supplies coming from domestic sources - rather than higher-priced foreign oil.

More good news - from energy czar William Simon. The chances are now "better than fifty-fifty" - said he that gasoline rationing will not be necessary this Spring. And this - said he - Arab oil embargo or no. MADRID

Sec. 4 State Henry Kissinger stopped off briefly in Madrid today

- enroute to the Middle East. Dr. Kissinger conferring with Spain's new Foreign Minister - one Pedro Cortina. In a Later statement, saving the U.S. and Spain will soon "draw up a declaration of principles - similar to those that exist between the U.S. and NATO and other European nations." Dr. Kissinger adding that "this declaration - will strengthen relations between our two countries." ASWAN FOLLOW MADRID

The U.S. See of State - this time Dr. Kissinger, then flew on to Egypt - landing of the Upper Nile resort city of Aswan. He immediately met with Egypt's President Sadat - who was there recuperating from the flu. Dr. Kissinger attempting to help bring about - a disengagement of troops along the Suez Canal., Schoduled to meet with Sadat again tomorrow - then fly no sthe to

SACRAMENTO

From the California Highway Patrol Z a report today on the results of a year-long crackdown on drunken driving. Patrol Commission, Walter Pudinski - disclosing that there were more than a hundred and twenty thousand drunk driving arrests; an increase of twenty-six per cent - over the previous year.

The Commissioner Pudinsky adding that these arrests clearly played

a major role - in reducing California highway deaths. The biggest surprise - said he: "Not that we could arrest so many drinking drivers -but the fact they were there to be arrested. "

At first - they thought it was just a junk, On closer inspection though - they heard a sound "like a kitten." And then a voice saying: "Oh, please, get me out - I'm so cold." was reported They did - and Mrs. Harris today, well on the road to

recovery. \*

GENEVA

From Geneva comes word today that the U.S. and Russia will resume SALT talks - at the end of this month. The coming negotiations aimed at finalizing an agreement in effect, a virtual freeze on the development of weapons such as multiple warhead missiles. Observers adding that the success of these talks - will determine whether President Nixon again travels to Russia this year, as originally planned.

## LONDONDERRY

At Londonderry in Northern Ireland - a car was literally blown apart today - by a bomb apparently planted by IRA terrorists. The car's occupants - a man and a woman - killed instantly. Both identified as civilian employes - in a nearby British Army barracks. Police theorizing that the was where the bomb was supposed to have gone off 4 sometime during working hours. As often happens though - a slight misculculation with tragic results.

### STOCKHOLM

A new Swedish Parliament - was convened today in Stockholm. King Carl the Sixteenth Gustaf - who ascended the throne just a few months ago - presiding at the ceremony for his first and possibly last time. The Parliament expected to take up as its first order of business - a new Constitution all but stripping the King of his few remaining powers.

There also is At the same time, a report that young King Carl -

is planning to wed a commoner. The lucky girl <del>suid to be</del> beautiful Silvia Sommerlath - age twenty-five - of Heidelberg, West Germany. Fraulein Sommerlath - a former hostess at the Munich Olympics, where they <del>apparently</del> met. <u>(in Stockholm - reportedly</u>) She also spent Christmas and New Year's attending a number

of family get-togethers at the Royal Palace.

# AUCKLAND
