GOOD EVENING EVERYBODY:

South Africa has decided to become - a Republic.
Replacing Queen Elizabeth with a President, as Head of
State. The vote, as expected, is almost entirely along
- national lines. The English in the Cape, defended
Her Majesty and opposed any move to eradicate the Crown.
The Afrikaaners just as strongly were against the Crown.
Since they make up a majority of the white population
of South AFRICA - the decision was in favor of a
Republic.

Not included in the vote were most of the
inhabitants of the Union of South Africa, the eleven
million colored people - who are not allowed to
participate in South African elections.

PHILIPPINES

The Philippines Ambassador to the U.N. -- today defended the American record on Colonialism. Francisco Delgado ^{contradicted} ~~XXXXXXXXXXXX~~ Khrushchev by describing the way in which his country -- voted itself free of United States control. He asked what would happen -- should any satellite try to vote itself free of Soviet control. And the Philippine spokesman answered his own question - by reminding the General Assembly of the fate of Hungary.

U.N.

The issue most certain to touch off a hot debate -- has come up in the U.N. The issue of -- Red/China. To give Mao Tse-tung a seat -- or not. That's the question. ~~The answer this year is the same as always.~~

The nations of the West, lining up behind the United States -- in refusing to accept Mao, and ^{out} ~~not out~~ Chiang Kai-shek.

CUBA

Or is Castro faking it -- for propaganda purposes?

Anyway, the Cuban dictator admits -- fighting continues in the Sierra de Escambray. The rebels, still defying Castro -- still holding out in the mountains.

KENNEDY

Tonight Senator Kennedy is concentrating on -- the problem of Cuba. The Democratic candidate, addressing a fund-raising dinner in Cincinnati -- again attacking the Administration's handling of Castro. Kennedy, who has repeatedly called Castro a serious threat to this hemisphere -- promises to move quickly to counteract Castro, if elected. Kennedy's stand~~point~~ on Cuba is being given top billing -- by his aids. They believe his remarks on Cuba -- are just what most Americans want to hear.

NIXON

Vice President Nixon ~~was~~^{WAS} in the South ~~and~~^{AGAIN TODAY} and talking about Civil Rights. Nixon ~~today~~ told a Nashville audience -- that candidates for national office should discuss this ^(issue) ~~issue~~ in the same way, everywhere in the country. Nixon, taking a slap at Kennedy -- whom Nixon accuses of soft-peddling Civil Rights in the South.

The Nixon Civil Rights declaration received -- only scattered applause. But the Nashville police tabbed the Vice President's reception as "twice the size of Kennedy's."
