President Kennedy must have felt special satisfaction today, when he awarded the National Geographic Society's Hubbard Medal for exploration to the American Everest expedition. The President presented the Gold Medal to the group's leader -Norman Dyhrenfurth - in the White House Rose Garden. Copies were given to the remaining seventeen Americans in the expedition, also to one British Ex-Army officer, one Nepal Army officer - and five Sherpas. The five Sherpas - Tibetans who live in Nepal represent a team of thierty-seven guides employed by the expedition.

Several 'firsts' were achieved by the climbers - last May. It was the first ascent of Everest - by an American. The first dual assault - by two teams. The first ascent of the West Ridge -

hitherto considered unclimbable. And the first traverse - of any major Himalayan Peak. All in all - quite a record.

The last man to receive the Hubbard medal John clenn, first American in space. Now, the
Americans who conquered Everest.

KHRUSHCHEV FOLLOW CHINESE

As for Khrushchev, he hasn't given them any greeting at all. In fact, he isn't even - in Moscow. The boss of the kremlin, off in Kiev in the Ukraine - talking with a Western statesman. Paul Henri Spaak, Foreign Minister of Belgium - one time head of Nato.

Khrushchev and Spaak are covering what Moscow calls "urgent international problems", with emphasis on - a possible nuclear test ban.

The point about the new regulations

ARGENTINA

In Argentina's presidential election returns today, "r. Arturo Illia, head of the so called People's Radical Party - maintains his sizeable lead. The People's Radical party is actually composed of Argentine moderates.

The blank ballot campaign run by backers of exiled Dictator Juan Peron - seems doomed to failure. This drop in support for Peron, comes in spite of unemployment - stalled economy and recurrent government crises. Some believe the Peronists now will merge with other parties.

VIET NAM

The city of Saigon is tense tonight following the suicide of South Viet Nam's greatest
writer Nguyen Tuong Tam, poet and philosopher - who
has been called the Victor Hugo of Southeast Asia,
because of his ability to illustrate philosophical
ideas through the daily lives of his characters - in
the manner of Victor Hugo.

The suicide - political. A protest against the government - of President Diem. Just as in the case of the Buddhist monk - who burned himself to death. The age-old oriental method of protest - suicide. Still effective - in South Viet Nam.

A celebration that took place in Friedrichshafen, Germany, today, will bring back memories - for many of us.

Today - the one hundred and twenty-fifth anniversary of the birth of Count Ferdinand Von Zepplin. Graf Zeppelin - father of the giant airships floated by gas that made their debut as long ago as Nineteen hundred - and operated on the Transatlantic run between the wars. They actually combined air travel - with all the luxury of great liners.

Then the "Hindenburg" pride of Cermany's fleet - which exploded near Lakehurst, New Jersey, in Nineteen thirty-seven? Killing thirty-six people. That was a blow - from which the Zeppelins never quite recovered. If they had had helium they might still be on that Transatlantic run.

At the celebration in Germany today, old
