Two votes - today cleared the way. First,
the Senators decided to end sixteen days of debate and bring the measure to the senate floor. Then they defeated a motion to send it back to committee. So the head-on collision we've been hearing too much about - is almost sure to take place soon, with opponents of the bill all set for a filibuster when the debate gets under way.

## FULBRIGHT

Senator Fulbright flatly denies-that he is an advocate of appeasment. The Arkansas Democrat, terming his attitude"Plain common sense." Meaning-his remarks on Panama and Cuba. He suggested that we agree to-a new Panama Canal treaty. And accept the fact-that Castro is likely to be around for a long time.

But if Fulbright doesn't consider that appeasementsome members of his party do. Congressman Selden of
Alabama compares himerimporito Neville Chamberlain. The Republicans? They ar en more outspoken; with $\lambda$ Congressman Wyman of New Hampshire, terming the Fulbright proposals-"surrender on the installment plan."

The President and the First Lady -are at
home tonight. At - their Texas home. The LBJ

Ranch, where they lived for a long time before they
entered the White House. They left Washington this
afternoon - to begin their Easter holiday, during
which the President will keep in touch with Domestic
and International affairs - even while he's supposed to be on vacation at the LBJ. Texas Ranch, sixty miles from Austin.

Has the Commandant of the Marine Corps given us the tipoff - on future strategy in south Diet Nam? General Wallace Greene says helicopters are not enough. We've been using the Whirlybirds - to launch attacks on the Red Guerrillas in the $j u n g l e$, and the General has no criticism - as far as troop transport is concerned. His point is that helicopters even armed helicopters - are too vulnerable to antiaircraft fire. More fighter planes are needed to support them, says the boss of the Marines.

GLENN FOLLOW MARINES

## General Greene took a moment at the National

Press Club in Washington today - to mention the most
famous member of the Marine Corps. Astronaut

John Glenn - who is in hospital with that head injury, had hoped to enter politics - as a candidate for the Senate. This meant resign from the Marines. But such resignations only take effect - on the first of the month. So, if col. Glenn doesn't leave the hospital, and take leave of the Marines by April first, he'll be delayed until May first, only four days before the Ohio Primary. His family to do the campaigning for him.

## MOSCOW

The warning that has just been issued in Moscow-is aimed at students of the Afro-Asian Bloc. The ones who have been staging demonstratdons-in the Soviet Capital. Especially the Africans-who claim the Russians discriminate against them; And the Moroccans-who last week invaded the Moroccan Embassy.

The Soviet Government is obviously afraid that the idea of demonstrating-will occur to more Afro-Asians. Which is the reason for this threat-to jail the ringleaders. And expel-the rest. Khrushchev has often applauded student demonstrations-against the west. But-Anti-Soviet demonstrations: The boss of the Kremlin-isn't quite so happy about those. In fact-he doesn't want any more of them.

Renamed - The "San Jacinto". Went back - into service
and split for a second time while off the coast of

Virginia - en route from Portland, Maine to Houston,

Texas.

Cause this time - an explosion in the engine
room. The blast, cracking the hull of the tanker just behind the wheelhouse.

Of the thirty-nine crewmen aboard, none
killed by the explosion. Thirty-seven still aboard the drifting stern of their vessel now being towed by the coast guard. Two others - were rescued from a
lifeboat. One, the only fatality of the incident. The victim of a heart attack.

A second epic of the sea, Dick, for the "Fort Mercer", now the "San Jacinto".
