In an unmarked village grave, high up in the mountains of northern Jugoslavia, the has fielded up the body of a fourth American airman shot down by the Jugoslavs on August ninetennth.

Together with his comrades, his remains were borne today, by oxcart, to the provincial capital.

Today in Ljubljana four lead caskets containing the bodies of four Americans who were killed for reasons they sould not possibly comprehend, were placed in a flower be-decked American weapons carrier. Two jeeps and four former German staff cars completed the funds funeral procession. The way led down the winding mountain road to the Italian frontier near Trieste. Along the route an honor guard from the Jugoslav fourth Army stood at stiff attention. Planes of the Jugoslavian Air Force, on orders from Marshal Tito, flew overhead, as a guard of hour.
