There was a terrific explosion in New York today. Eighteen huge tanks of the Standard Oil Company caught fire and blew up. The explosion occured in the borough of Brooklyn.

A fire started and then those tanks went off one after another, like gigantic fire-crackers. According to the Associated Press, the oil **xxx** even spread into the East River, and then thr river caught fire. The flames spread to piers and warehouses and for a time the whole Williemsburg section of Brooklyn was in danger.

BURMA

That earthquake I told you about last night, the mysterious one recorded by the instruments at the Harvard Observatory, well, the scientists were right. It occured a long way off.
