It's on the way to the moon. Our Ranger
Seven hurtling through space tonight heading for our
natural satellite with everything so far o-kay.

Which no doubt explains the silence of the Moscow

news media on this particular subject. But in Paris
they are talking about it - and have been - ever since
the arrival of the Roumanian Premier.

The premier defied Moscow to make this jaunt to the city of light and bucharest is anxious to play host to DeGaulle - for an obvious reason, and Khrushchev nowadays wouldn't dare interfere if the President of France decided to return the visit. And a visit from DeGaulle would help Roumania become more independent of the Soviet Union.

Another dilemma for the Kremlin - when Khrushchev and his colleagues put their heads together.

men using Macao as a base to smuggle opium into the

United States.

But this is not a story by Sax Rohmer - about Fu Manchu. It's a melodrama by Nikita Khrushchev - about Mao Tse Tung. The boss of the Kremlin charging that the strong man of Red China - runs a world wide opium ring, out of Macao. The plot - has a neat twist. What Khrushchev objects to - is not the opium but the island. He says Macao proves that Peking is allied with Portugal. With - the capitalist exploiters.

Mao's answer - an indignant repudiation of the charge. He insists that he wouldn't think of using Portuguise Macao as a base for his opium business.

The world war Two bomb discovered in

London's financial district - is bringing back a lot

of memories. Remember those fire raids on London 
in December of Nineteen forty, the Nazis dropping

tons and tons of explosives and phosphorus - much of

it in the area of St. Paul's Cathedral. Where it

wiped out one whole area of the British capital.

Not all the fire bombs exploded and one more of them somehow got lost in the rubble.

Not uncovered until today - when a bulldozer hit it, and touch it off. No casualties, but it caused a bit of excitement - before the bomb disposal squad took it away. One more big Nazi fire bomb that's been lying in London's financial district for these twenty-four years.

The honors that are being lavished on Sir Winston Churchill have not been paralleled since the days of the Duke of Wellington. The occasion, as you may have heard, is Churchill's retirement from the House of Commons. The elder statesman of the free world, dropping the political career that began when Queen Victoria was on the throne. Back - in nineteen one. And took him to his "Finest Hour" forty years later - when he roused the British to stand alone against Nazi Germany.

Almost unimaginable - to us of the Twentieth

Century. The House of Commons without Winstone

Churchill.

A train trapped in the High Andes caught ina blizzard. The engineer began the run from Salta in northwest Argentina, five days ago. Destination -Antofagasta, Chile. Of course it's winter in the Southern Hemisphere. And, heavy snow began to fall as the train reached the upper Andes. Winds of fifty miles an hour - whipping the snow into deep drifts across the tracks; and the train ground to a halt. Tonight there it is trapped in thirteen feet of snow much as "the city of San Francisco" was trapped out here in the High Sierra. That was in January Nineteen fifty-two, says Southern Pacific Merle Jennings who was in charge of the rescue on that one.

Now on the Argentine-Antofagasta run, way up at fourteen thousand feet, some Chilean Merle Jennings is on the way to rescue trainmen and passengers trapped in the lofty andes.

## GREAT LAKES

If you happen to be a geology buff - you might try your science on this:- How can we stop the Great Lakes - from sinking?

The problem is acute, according to a conference of scientists and business men - at Michigan State

University. The level of the Great Lakes - subsiding at the astonishing rate of one foot in one year. The water line - receeding farther and farther off shore.

Docks - left high and dry. Vessels having a harder time negotiating shallower and shallower stretches between Lake Superior and Lake Ontario. Cost of shippers in the millions.

The largest inland water area in the world - sinking - those Great Lakes of North America.

Now let's consider a public figure. Who would you say - fits the following description? A man now in middle life - born in cattle country, worked hard during his youth and became a teacher in the nineteen thirties, entered politics and was elected to the legislature, and finally became President.

Sounds like Lyndon Johnson. But no, the name is Siranana. The country, the Malagasy Rep ublic on the Great Island of Madagascar. President Johnson points out how the description does fit both himself and his guest from Madagascar, that island off the east coast of Africa where life is a bit different - where they even have man eating trees. One difference President Johnson noted: That President Siranana is not up for re-election this year in Malagasy - Madagasan
